

AIDS Is A Gay Disease?

The Los Angeles Gay and Lesbian Center has attracted a lot of attention with a recent media campaign: "AIDS is a Gay Disease," their ads declare, "Own It: End It." The L.A. Times reports the Center is targeting the gay male community who, they say, appear to be "slacking off" in their vigilance against the epidemic.

While it is true that men who have sex with men still constitute the majority of HIV/AIDS cases in North America, the L.A. Center's campaign is a radical departure from the traditional portrayal of HIV/AIDS as a disease that affects everyone. The Times reported some AIDS counsellors as concerned that the campaign will play into the stigma already attached to HIV/AIDS, and that it could be an obstacle to future research funding. In the Times article, the head of L.A. based AIDS Healthcare Foundation, Michael Weinstein stated

that AIDS is not a "gay" disease, "it is a disease of the immune system," he said.

One can't argue with Michael Weinstein's statement, but there's no denying that the campaign is at least provocative. Those of us who were around in the early years of the health crisis can remember the fear and hysteria surrounding what was briefly called the "gay cancer". Back then it was important to establish that AIDS posed a threat to everyone, not just gay men. We needed (and still need) the financial backing of governments and corporations, and the full support of the scientific community to fight this epidemic. Yet it was the gay community that faced the mounting casualties and mobilised in resistance. Furthermore, our community's response to HIV/AIDS has had a profound impact on community-based health care across the developed world. One

cannot examine any community health issue without seeing the footprints of our community's artists and activists who engaged in the fight against AIDS. From "Walks for Life" to Fashion Cares, from coloured ribbons to the delivery of experimental treatments for those who are ill, we changed everything.

Now the world's focus on HIV/AIDS seems to be shifting towards women and the Third World. Can it be that North American gay men feel somewhat marginalised from this issue that once so dominated our lives? Or is it, what with our ready access to drug therapies and health-care, that we are in danger of becoming complacent? Is this a factor in the recent rise in rates of transmission? It was certainly a matter of concern for some gay male delegates attending the 2006 AIDS Conference in Toronto.

Last Month's Question

Last month's question, "How kinky are you?" solicited only four scant replies. Perhaps we should have followed one reader's suggestion that we expand the question. It seems we Atlantic Canadians are somewhat shy of confessing our kinks, at least in print. "Not very," wrote one Wayves' reader. However, a naughtier sort responded, "If you think of it, I'll probably do it. I only draw the line at blood and brown."

When the question was posed at an editorial meeting, a member of the Wayves collective said that he'd tell us but for the fact that "you'd all get turned on!" Hmmm. What are that young man's secrets?

Happy Spring to you. Still can't get over the fact that you in the Land of Oz are enjoying a warmer, brighter season even as the days grow shorter and the light becomes dimmer here.

Her look of sweet kindness never wavering, she whispered to me, "If one of those fuckers tracks through my lawn display, I'll kill him." I snorted into my egg nog and we became sisters!

Happiness is the best therapy.

Therapists, now there's another topic! I've gone through all the free ones -you get what you pay for! My last therapist suggested a little break would be good for us - and truthfully, he was beginning to look a bit worn down. Then the phone started to ring. My Dad called to say how great the article was, and congratulate me, and friends and relatives called to do the same. Our office manager said that her 12-year-old had seen the picture and pointed it out to her; my boss said his kid had woken him up that Saturday morning clutching the paper in his hand, saying, "Daddy, your company's in the paper!" A young project manager from a competing company edgily hinted that he was very interested in the article. In the local newsgroup hfx.general, people commented about how progressive it was for Duffy to have chosen to enlighten himself.

At one of my client sites, the official newspaper clipping clerk cut out the article and stuck a post-it on it: "Hi Dan. Just in case you didn't get a copy." She drew a dimpled smiley after her name.

When do you stop coming out? Isn't a quarter century enough? Apparently not. I'll keep at it.

The "Sex Now" Project- Seeds for Growth

In July 2005, during Pride Week in Halifax, more than 300 men participated in the Nova Scotia "Sex Now" Survey, the most comprehensive study yet made of gay men in our region, (albeit one limited to those men who attended Halifax's Pride Week). One year later, Wayves' July issue reported on its findings in a detailed article by Gary Brooks. Developed as a collaborative effort by Russell Westhaver of St. Mary's University, and Robert Allan, then Executive Director of the AIDS Coalition of Nova Scotia (ACNS), the survey reveals a vivid portrait of the men who completed the survey. It confirms some assumptions and confounds others while delineating who we are: our incomes; our social lives; our use of drugs and alcohol, and, most importantly, our sexual knowledge, practices and vulnerabilities. The 2005 survey's final report is available online. It makes for fascinating reading. Visit the ACNS website at www.acns.ns.ca and click on "Services". The report is listed under "Survey" on the right hand side of the page.

Now the project is taking a big step forward. In March of this year, representatives from the Atlantic region's major community based AIDS organisations: the AIDS Committee of Western Newfoundland; AIDS Committee

of Newfoundland and Labrador; AIDS PEI; AIDS New Brunswick; SIDA AIDS Moncton; AIDS St. John; the Northern AIDS Connection Society; the AIDS Coalition of Cape Breton; Healing Our Nations and the AIDS Coalition of Nova Scotia all met together in Halifax. Since then they have been holding regular teleconferences with Professor Westhaver. After revising the questionnaire, they are extending the survey beyond Nova Scotia to include all four Atlantic Provinces. The approach to gathering information has also changed to what is known as "Respondent Driven Sampling" (RDS), a method that relies on the men who participate to draw more men into the survey. This should allow researchers to map out the social networks that gay and bisexual men create, as well as incorporating men who have sex with men (msm) who don't identify as gay.

The participating groups handed out survey packages to certain selected individuals, known in the language of RDS as 'seeds'. Every package contained the questionnaire and three coupons, which the seeds were then to pass along to three other men. Each coupon has a number code and the toll-free number for the Research Centre at

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Saint John Walk for Life Shines In Rain

Chilly autumn rain did nothing to dampen the spirits of the 150 walkers who turned out on Sunday, Sept 24, to support the Walk for Life. The walkers represented 12 teams plus numerous participants who came to walk as individuals. New teams this year were Old Navy and École Millidgeville North, making this the first year we've had participation from a middle school team.

MC Alesha Farren introduced this year's Honourary Walk Chair, Saint John's Deputy Mayor Michelle Hooton. Hooton is a strong supporter of the Sex Trade Action Committee (STAC), on which AIDS Saint John is a key partner. After Hooton had spoken to the crowd about the importance of the Walk, she and the other walkers swung into action as Sister Irene Beuchler led them in a bit of line-dancing before they hit the Harbour Passage trail. The City of Saint John has been lengthening the trail every year, so AIDS Saint John staff members "Nicky" Nickerson and Jeff Tibbo thoughtfully decorated it with encouraging signs reading, "Great work! Keep walking," and, "You're almost there."

The walkers raised almost \$11,500. The top team was the Dickison family, long-time supporters of AIDS Saint John who raised the money in memory of Wayne Dickison. Lois Martin, Wayne's aunt, was the top individual walker. Generous amounts were also raised by the Sisters of Charity, Wyndham Worldwide and Hampton High School. Sister Angie Martz was the runner-up for top walker, while Sister Zetta Whelley took the prize for "Golden" walker. The prize for youngest walker went to Terri-Lynn Reid's 15-day-old daughter, who's going to follow in her Mom's footsteps as soon as she starts walking on her own. Terri-Lynn has MC'd two previous Walks for Life and was one of the youth facilitators in AIDS Saint John's recently completed Harm Reduction Project.

The Walk wouldn't be possible without the efforts of AIDS Saint John's volunteers and sponsors. We'd like to thank the Hardman Group for the use of Market Square and the Leisure Services Department of the City of Saint John for the use of Harbour Passage. Local band Digby Wolf kept Walk registration rockin'. Thanks to Tim Horton's, Ganong's and Coca Cola, no one died of either starvation or caffeine withdrawal. Prizes were donated by Bayview Credit Union - which also raised almost \$800 - Paderno, Staples, Agnes Mew and Darlene Smith.

All funds raised by the AIDS Walk for Life will be used to fund programs in the Sussex-to-St. Stephen area, Health Region 2. However, AIDS Saint John also works in partnership with SIDA/AIDS Moncton and The AIDS Information & Support Centre to assist people infected and affected by HIV/AIDS in the African country of Swaziland. On the same day as the Walk for Life took place in Saint John, volunteers in Hampton held a garden party that raised \$6,820 for people in the village of Nkamazi.

The amount of work that remains to be done in the fight against HIV/AIDS, both on a worldwide scale and here in New Brunswick, is daunting. But we're working on it - step by step.

"We just want our daughter to feel safe."

No conversation with your daughter starts well when it begins with, "I have something I need to tell you." In a split second your mind races through all the possibilities of what she might say next. "I'm pregnant." "I'm quitting university." "I've been assaulted." There's no end to what it could be and none of the choices are good.

The one we weren't prepared for, the one that never crossed our minds was "I'm a lesbian."

It was Christmas. This was not the present we were expecting to receive. Socks for me would have been fine. I'm sure Mary would have been happy with a sweater. But then Ainsley has never been much of a traditionalist.

There were tears. There were hugs and kisses. There was awkward silence and then there was lots of discussion. Ainsley knew we wouldn't reject her. Her upbringing gave her the confidence to know she didn't have to worry about our being angry. Although at a time like this you search your memory for any possible homophobic comment you might have ever made in her presence whether in jest or not. Anything you might have said that would have hurt her.

Almost two years later, it's still hard to describe our reaction to this revelation. Surprised? Definitely. Shocked? Somewhat. Worried? Absolutely. Despite our liberal values and the fact we have gay members of our extended family, this was different. This was our daughter. We love her unconditionally and while

we knew this revelation wouldn't change the way we felt about her, it was not what we wanted for her. We knew she didn't choose to be a lesbian but it seemed to us her life would be easier if she was straight. You don't get singled out for being heterosexual. And so we worried about what her life was going to be like.

If any word comes close to capturing how we felt, ironically it's Pride. We were proud our daughter felt comfortable enough in her relationship with us that she could tell us something this important in her life; proud that we had raised her to be a confident young woman able to recognize who she is. Our pride has only grown as we have watched her activism surface. She worked tirelessly to organize last year's National Day Against Homophobia event in Charlottetown and was involved in a number of Gay Pride activities.

Although she now lives and works in Toronto, for the past two summers she has come back to the Island to work at the Confederation Centre of the Arts as Stage Manager for the Young Company. It was during the first summer she was home we learned of an incident that has led us to come out of the closet as well. She and her girlfriend were verbally assaulted by a woman while attending an outdoor concert in Charlottetown. This woman took offense to them holding hands and showing affection and started screaming at

them. They were also subjected to rude comments as they walked down the street holding hands. It hurt them deeply and made them nervous about going out in public together. Nobody has the right to make other people afraid to walk the streets of our communities. Our tourism advertising may promote the Island as a kinder, gentler place but that's not the case for everyone. What our daughter

experienced was mild in comparison to what many gay people are subjected to in P.E.I.

As parents, it's natural to want to protect your children from the cruelties of the world. It's even more difficult being young and gay. We felt we needed to become activists to support our daughter. We learned about PFLAG, an organization for parents and friends of people who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender or two-spirited (GLBT). We met a group of people who are just like us. People trying to make sense of why their daughters and sons are so ostracized for being who they are and looking for ways to make the Island a safer place for people who are GLBT.

Many parents whose sons and daughters have come out to them struggle with how to deal with the news. Members of PFLAG have helped many families work through their feelings by listening, accepting and not judging. Unfortunately, we've heard many parents and family members say they could never come to a meeting because someone might see them. The Island is a very small place.

Originally we didn't set out to become active in working towards making this a safer place for people who are GLBT. We were content to support our daughter in private and be public with only those we chose to tell. But our involvement with PFLAG Canada-PEI led us to assist with a series of workshops held last year in Summerside, Charlottetown and Montague out of which came two projects called Creating Safe Communities. One is in Summerside, the other in Montague. We have joined a group of individuals

from fields of health, justice, social services, education, government and the general public that has come together in each town to develop ways to make these two communities more inclusive. We want to address issues that have made many Island residents feel it's okay to target GLBT persons for scorn, ridicule and sometimes physical assault.

Our daughter should feel safe when she comes home.

Canadian Military: Not As Open As You Think!

Canada is supposed to have one of the most advanced militaries in the world when it comes to GLBT issues, but the issue is not as well accepted as one might think it is.

We are two Canadian university researchers doing a study examining homosexuality and the Canadian military (past & present aspects of how it was handled and how people lived this experience). In order to understand this reality, we do interviews with past and present GLBT Canadian Forces (CF) service members and anyone who was or is partnered (GLBT partners) with a military member. Understandably, we are trying to reach a population that is very difficult to find. Earlier this spring, we decided that we would advertise in CF newspapers. These are newspapers that are in-large controlled by the military but still have a civilian private component (e.g., they make revenue by running classified and professional ads). The end of February 2006, the Naval newspaper, the Lookout, ran an editorial on our research (see web site: <http://www.lookoutnewspaper.com/archive/20060228/3.shtml>). We also ran a classified ad about the study for 2 weeks just prior

to the editorial's appearance. This was a successful undertaking as we had a couple of GLBT military people contact us to participate in our study. Given this success, we decided to run classified ads (yes, only a classified ad) in all CF newspapers in Canada. However, within one month, the Canadian military headquarters sent a message out to all bases, informing all CF newspapers not to run any

of our advertisements. Yes a ban on a classified ad. We contacted the military department responsible for this ban, the Director of Human Resources Research & Evaluation, Colonel S.A.T. Eyres. He said that they, "the Canadian military" did not want it to appear as if they had approved or was associated with the research project.

We find it very strange that Canada's military that has done many things to be open regarding homosexuality and GLBT issues would come to such a decision. The Department couched its rationalisations with words such as "protecting the soldier from unwanted solicitations" and "its not in the best interests of the military mission," we wonder why embracing and prompting diversity is not important to the CF.

As you can see, despite the liberated nature of Canadian laws and CF policies (e.g., 1992), our military still finds a way to discriminate today.

executive producer of GLBT travel series, BUMP!, and Re:Source Media headed by Kevin Fox. The original owner, Score Media Inc. (headed by John Levy) is also a shareholder. Another shareholder with a substantial presence in Canada is Pink Triangle Press, the country's largest and longest running gay and lesbian media group, a not-for-profit organization that has been a driving force in the gay and lesbian community for over 30 years. OUTtv is a digital specialty

network providing programming of interest to the GLBT community and GLBT-positive viewers across Canada. Originally launched in Sept/01, it is the world's first GLBT network to broadcast "24-7".

1 shallot minced	2 L beef consommé
1 jalapeno pepper minced	Salt and fresh cracked pepper to taste
1/4 head white cabbage (shredded)	32 cheese filled tortellini (store bought fresh pasta)
1 tbsps dried basil	
1 tsp dried oregano	

1. In a medium size soup pot, on med-high heat, sweat onions, shallots, celery garlic, jalapeno, cabbage and herbs until they begin to brown.
2. Add the white wine to pot and cook it down until reduced by half.
3. Add the tomatoes and broths bring to the boil, reduce heat and uncovered for simmer uncovered for 1 hour.
4. Cook tortellini in boiling salted water until tender, place in bottom of soup plate and ladle soup over top. Garnish with grated parmesan cheese and fresh chives

Love & Trust: More Than Sex

Liberal MP Dominic LeBlanc made some comments: "One of the fundamental tenets of a democracy is the separation of church and state..." (NB Telegraph-Journal, 9 Sept 06).

This brought a response from a Catholic, Ted Doucet that LeBlanc can't have it both ways.

I countered with "Catholics disagree in same sex debate," quoting Amherst lawyer Peter Belliveau who wrote in the Amherst Daily News that "There is nothing that means more to me than my Catholic faith." Belliveau then goes on to disagree strongly with the pope and Archbishop Prendergast. Belliveau clearly distinguishes between a church wedding and a civil wedding - noting that both are legal in Canada.

On comes J. Esmonde Barry. In a petulant tone, he reminds me that every denomination has its dissidents. "Hay is wrong.. he tries to confuse readers by mixing apples and oranges." This is immediately followed by Barry's last paragraph: "If Eldon Hay is sincere about the gay cause, let him establish his credibility by telling the public when and why he had an epiphany to embark upon a mission advocating this gay lifestyle."

Then in the NB Telegraph-Journal under the title, "Love, trust matter more than sex," letter writer Barry asks, "If Eldon Hay is sincere about the cause for gays let him establish his credibility by telling the public when, under what circumstances and why he had an epiphany to embark upon a mission advocating [his cause]."

It's a privilege to respond. I've been gifted with a straight son, Keith, and a gay son, Ron. I love both sons, and their partners. It's inappropriate to say that either is sinful due to orientation. Each will be wrong if his orientation is used in a self-serving manner. In both, sexuality can be an expression of love and mutual trust, It's unbecoming to expect either will change his sexual orientation. Both were born the way; : neither of them "chose their lifestyle." Rather their orientation was given to them with the colour of their eyes. Actually, I'm doubly blessed. I have a gay son and straight son; I'm also the father of a lesbian daughter, Nancy, and a straight daughter, Heather.

Straight or gay sons, lesbian or straight daughters - these are manifestations of God's creation. Gratefully, in Canada, their essential equality is also guaranteed by law.

But if you're a teenage girl who sings and dances with the local community theatre group, you couldn't be a lesbian, right? So why is Beth fascinated by fellow cast member Catherine? Is it really just her beautiful singing voice? And why does baby dyke Melinda secretly pretend to be Maria in the Sound of Music? And



what about the uptight lecturer Jane? Is there something she'd like to get off her chest? Three characters representing different decades (80s, 90s, present) take the stage in this one-woman show to tell their sometimes excruciating, sometimes hilarious stories, sing a

Something old something new - The old stuff was society's attitude towards people like me and something new was the internet. I will admit that the internet was instrumental in accomplishing what were to be the most dramatic changes in my life. Some I suppose would say the internet was to blame, showing only their ignorance of the situation I found myself in. I sat one night in the dark with this new world of the internet in front of me. I was so afraid, so ashamed, so confused and if I am honest, very close to suicide. A lot of people misunderstand suicide. Some people consider suicide as a coward's way out of life's problems. For someone like me the act is actually more because we have nothing that we want to live for. We are not able to be who people say we are. We cannot be who we know we are. Can you imagine working and raising a family, detesting the

very clothes you wear, and hating the fact food makes this body grow stronger in opposition to every desire and understanding of your heart and head? If we attempt to correct the imbalances that we feel, we are threatened with separation from family, friends, loss of access to our workplace and relegation to a place of social depravity along with a social un-acceptance that would destroy any sane person. To acquire these distinguished options we must find not one mental health professional but sometimes two to five. In my life time I have seen more than twelve. We must convince them we are sane. That wanting to cut off our genitals and remove healthy breasts and organs so rendering ourselves useless for purposes of reproduction is obviously a sane and logical step. As if to prove we are insane they would demand we first divorce our spouses (regardless of the spouse's desires) leave the home where we

are loved and live in the opposite gender for a year without hormones, support or legal status. At the end of that year I am sure that they still thought we were crazy, but obviously determined. So they obliged us with hormones and discussed surgery. Of course the majority of our community have been required to pay for everything themselves; Often including even the counseling, whether we wanted it or not. As they put us through this trial of endurance they pointed out that very few survive. Hmmm, I have no idea why that would be.


I am glad to report that unlike the shrink that offered me shock therapy and the other shrink that told me as long as I admitted I was a sinner, they would treat me; today's healthcare is a little better informed and even the ill-informed know enough to find us better help. But still the majority of the people treat us in order to help make us

what they think we are rather than who we are. Of course the pinnacle of success for a transsexual is to complete transition and gain that treasured status of legal male or female in; I love this part, our chosen gender. We never choose to be the new gender, we just find it impossible to live in the lie of the gender someone else placed on us at birth. After all, who knows who you are better than you yourself. While some struggle with sexual orientation issues, for the most part they know which gender they are. Transsexuals often never really have a sexual orientation that can be clearly defined. After all, sexual orientation is based on the gender status of the two parties involved. Since we "change" gender and some are guided by our new gender and others by our old, it becomes impossible to define with certainty our sexual orientation status. We never have a gender that can be fully accepted by all and so the only



thing they can define is which gender we prefer to have sex with. All the surgery, shrinks and training amounts to being challenged for almost every basic right a person thinks they have. They even got to say whether the name we chose was acceptable. So, I sat in the dark. I was afraid, I was very afraid. I had found a support site and typed an email, then I sat and I sat, and I sat the whole time, in the dark and crying quietly. After several hours I hit the send button and as soon as it said sent I hit the close down button and went to bed. Only now I was even more afraid. "Oh My Lord" I cried in my heart as I cried tears into my pillow, "what have I done."

The opening scene of *FAQS* is at a motel where India, a young homeless gay man, has just had sex on camera for money. Afterwards, he goes to a diner and discovers the "money" in the envelope is actually just paper. India is not having a good day. Angry and discouraged, he is heading back to the underpass

where he's been sleeping when he runs into two gay bashers who chase him into an underground garage. His bad day seems to be getting worse. But rescue arrives—not a knight on a white charger, but rather a drag queen on stilettos named Destiny.

India is taken home and becomes part of Destiny's family, which already includes a boyish lesbian named Lester. Destiny's household has only two rules: no sex without condoms, and two hours of nudity a day to overcome shame about bodies.

Safe and accepted in a place to call home, India becomes fired up with the zeal to rescue other gays and to get revenge on the straights who've mistreated him. When he meets Spence, a young man whose reasons for revenge are even more compelling than his, the two begin to make a plan, but how far can they follow revenge without themselves being destroyed?

Rescue and revenge are the main themes in this tribute to queer activism but director and writer, Everett Lewis, has also made *FAQS* a very individual human story full

of humour and warmth. Joe Lia makes his film debut in the role of India and gives a wonderfully natural performance, seemingly fearless in showing the vulnerability of a young man reeling from hurt yet retaining a yearning for affection and love.

The star of this film is undoubtedly Allan Louis as Destiny, the mother figure, advisor, flamboyant performer and friend. The role was created specifically for Louis and he inhabits it. From the slightest gesture of her perfectly manicured nails to the haughty shake of her bewigged head, Destiny is an irresistible force of nature: Mother Nature—and just as regal, strong, nurturing and protective of her children.

There are flaws in the film: the narrative is occasionally jumpy and the hostility of the evil straight world is rather oversimplified, but the actors give fine, convincing performances and overall *FAQS* has considerable charm.

one geographic centre but rather a triangle created by Fredericton, Moncton and Saint John. The NBRA flew into the New Brunswick triangle and vanished. In an attempt at geographical equity, meetings were rotated among the three municipalities. In practice, this meant that different groups of people attended each successive meeting and often spent most of their time redoing the work from the previous meeting. Five years later, the NBRA exists only as an e-mail list.

Not only does New Brunswick lack a geographic centre, the three largest municipalities are all located in the southern part of the province, making it difficult to get full participation from the north. Furthermore, roughly a third of New Brunswickers are Francophone, so any truly province-wide group has

to be able to operate in both official languages.

These problems are not insurmountable, but to date they've prevented the formation of a provincial group that can provide political leadership on LGBTT2IQ issues. Temporary task forces may form in reaction to specific issues, as happened with the Lord government's bill on civil marriage officials. As things stand now, however, the responsibility for educating New Brunswick MLAs lies with individual New Brunswickers and, where they exist, with local groups.

to notice ... what do you do when the one thing in life you want (your straight friend) is the thing you can never have ... lying there listening to her breathing ... it comes to you that all you can ever hope for will not happen for there will always be another guy and she will never choose you ... and you learn that 11 Bayer aspirins taken one at a time will not do the trick for you are too much of a coward to either end your life or to go on living ... (and lastly) ... My thesis: No Lesbians in Musical Theatre - is it Biology or Conspiracy?"

It's a pity the show was only 45 minutes long.

St. Mary's University in Halifax. When a coupon-holder calls in, he is invited to participate in the survey and to become a seed himself. Think of a seed growing into a tree with branches spreading out in all directions; each new branch represents a new generation in the tree's growth. The more generations between the seed, its branches and their offshoots, the more the survey becomes truly "respondent driven". This ensures that the data collected is randomly generated and therefore more valid.

Research assistants at St. Mary's compile the data, and this is an important guarantee of confidentiality. St. Mary's has strict protocols in place and only grants its ethical approval to the project if those protocols are adhered to. If a man with a coupon calls the toll free number, the survey (including coupons to pass along) will be sent to him by mail, but his address is not stored in any file or database. The researcher will ask if it's possible make a follow-up call to see if the coupons are

being distributed, but that's up to the respondent and he is perfectly free to decline. If the man calling in is uncomfortable receiving the survey in the mail, he can complete it over the phone, using only the number code on his coupon. He will remain completely anonymous to the researcher. The only drawback there, from a research point of view, is that the chain is broken and that respondent will not himself be a seed. Even the identities of the original seeds are protected, known only to the persons who contacted them. Approximately one hundred surveys have been handed out so far and more than half have been completed. Calls are now coming in from the next wave. It is crucial, however, that seeds pass on their coupons and follow up in encouraging their contacts to call the research line.

The revised survey's questions take only a few minutes to answer, but they will reveal an accurate picture of our community's health and well-being, and the more men

who participate, the more detailed that portrait will be. Since the survey relies on our engagement with it as a community to succeed, we have not only a vested interest in that success but a measure of ownership in the results. The "Sex Now" Survey has the potential to do much more than gather statistics relating to HIV/AIDS, as vital as those are. It may well have a defining impact on how health-care providers and institutions from across Atlantic Canada, along with their federal counterparts, approach the whole area of gay men's health. Perhaps most importantly, with its snapshot of who we are, with all our differences and subtleties, it guarantees that we are no longer invisible, and can never be made so again.

Mark was fabulous as the 2006 guest speaker and much better in person than on TV/radio. He has really beautiful eyes and his photographs do not do him justice. I had several opportunities to talk with him. He is so personable and approachable and makes you feel that you are important to him. What a guy!

Mark shared many valuable insights in his talk. Before Mark came out his reality was one of living in shame and not being able to talk about it. Mark's ties with his family are great now but weren't when he came out. "If I could just tell them I am gay everything would be okay, but what I thought would happen didn't. Instead of coming together, we fell apart." It was not great in the world of sport either when Mark came out. He says being gay sets you apart for he would hear "It's okay that you're gay ... just don't talk about it." Mark spoke of the "toxicity of labels" and notions in Olympic sports that all male athletes are straight and all female athletes are lesbians; slowly the myths are fading and the lot of gay athletes is getting better. The Outgames were for Mark working together with the mainstream world to build bridges of mutual respect between the straight and gay world and attitudes started to shift. Mark's life since coming out is one of progress so that he is now a person who is gay - not just a gay person. We can all follow Mark's example using his book as a guide for what to do and what not to do.

Who are the HIV/AIDS experts?

Health Minister Tony Clement must be an expert on HIV/AIDS issues. He said that he refuses to deal with the "so-called experts" at the conference in Montreal. He fails to realize that these men and women are the experts. The medical researchers and the activists who must continually fight with the powers in governments around the world for proper funding to curb the pandemic, these are the people in the thick of the problem. The millions who have died and the millions still living with HIV/AIDS are the experts.

Clement and his boss Stephen Harper have deliberately ignored this world conference. As soon as the Prime Minister indicated he would not make an appearance, the red flag went up, way up. He accused the conference of being politicized. Well, it has to be, if governments refuse to dole out enough money for research. If politics were taken out of the equation, there would be no assistance forthcoming from the government coffers. This week has certainly opened the eyes of people from around the world. It is without doubt a slap in the face for caring Canadians and, most of all, for the thousands who live with HIV/

AIDS and the researchers who must be provided the financing in order to find a vaccine to cure this dreaded pandemic.

This unfortunate incident once more illustrates the unwillingness of Stephen Harper to acknowledge anything to do with what he thinks is a gay disease. It shows a pattern so obvious. It seems a deliberate attempt to grasp at anything involving the queer community and put it in the trash bin. The shameful behaviour of the Prime Minister and the Health Minister is totally unwarranted and unacceptable to our community, as well as to the straight community. As the world watched and listened, the Conservative government faltered in any effort to embrace this issue with the dignity it deserves. It was a sad week for Canadians as Harper and Clement especially, suddenly became the experts. Neither of these men is a scientist or medically trained.

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September 18 New Brunswick Election: The Topple That Wasn't

Looking for the effect of LGBTT2IQ issues on the September 18 provincial election in New Brunswick is like looking for a needle in a haystack that doesn't contain any needles. For one thing, despite the media headlines – “Liberals topple Lord's Tories” – there was no revolution. 80% of the MLAs returning to Legislature will be previous incumbents. Of the 11 “newbie” MLAs, only four won against incumbent candidates. The other seven won seats in ridings where the incumbent was not running again.

Shawn Graham's Liberals lost the popular vote by 1,333 votes. However, when the dust settled, the Liberals had managed to pick up three extra seats to give them a total of 29, while the Tories lost two seats and were left with only 26. The Liberals didn't topple the Tories. They snuck past them.

In Fredericton-Silverwood, former Justice Minister Brad Green, a long-time opponent to equality for same-sex couples in marriage and adoption, lost by 455 votes to Liberal

Rick Miles. In Fredericton-Fort Nashwaak, Liberal incumbent Kelly Lamrock, with a strong record of support on LGBTT2IQ issues, won by 1,017 votes against Tory challenger Heather Hughes, vice-president of the Fredericton chapter of the Canada Family Action Coalition.

The LGBTT2IQ vote in action? Maybe, maybe not. One Fredericton voter explained the outcome this way: “[Green] was seen as Lord's right hand guy in Fredericton and Lord has pissed off Fredericton in many aspects. Thus Lord's gov't (and Green) got defeated. Fredericton overall went Liberal... Fredericton-Fort Nashwaak where Kelly Lamrock (Lib.) ran and won has been supportive of LGBT issues, but again... Fredericton overall seemed to want the Conservatives out of power.”

Bernard Lord himself and his Minister of Family and Community Services, Tony Huntjens – no friend to same-sex couples on adoption issues – both won their seats by 989 and 282 votes respectively.

The only party that mentioned LGBTT2IQ issues at any time during the campaign was the NDP, led by Allison Brewer. At the time Brewer was elected to the leadership less than a year before the election on September 25,

2005, there was some mention in the media of the fact that she's an out lesbian. However, this didn't appear to come up again during the 2006 campaign.

At the time of the election, the NDP had not held a seat in the Legislature since October 13, 2005, when former Leader Elizabeth Weir resigned. The party's election campaign was plagued by a lack of financial resources. The NDP also at times seemed disorganized, as when seven of its 55 would-be candidates failed to meet the deadline for submitting their applications to the Chief Electoral Officer.

For whatever reason, the NDP failed to gain any seats and won only 5% of the popular vote. This is the lowest percentage they've won since 1974. (In 1978, they won 6%,

and in the 1982-2003 elections, they won 9-11% each time.) In the wake of these results, some NDP candidates publicly criticized Brewer, while others defended her. One of the critics was Roger Duguay, the NDP's strongest contender with 26% of the vote in Miramichi Bay-Neguac. According to Duguay, Brewer was a tough sell to Francophone voters because she's not fluent in French and to Catholic voters because she was a founder and former manager (1994-1999) of the Morgentaler abortion clinic in Fredericton. The fact that she's a lesbian apparently had no effect.

At the same time, NDP president Pat Hanratty appealed to members for increased financial support. Major political parties in New Brunswick receive an annual allowance from the province based on the number of votes they received in the most recent general election. For the past three years, the NDP has been receiving an allowance based on the 36,989 votes it garnered in 2003. In September's election, that figure dropped by 48% to 19,212 votes. This decrease will cost the NDP approximately \$31,000 each year until the next election. And to make matters worse, only two NDP candidates – Duguay and Brewer – won the

minimum 15% of the vote required to get a rebate on their election expenses from the province.

Historically, the NDP has shown the strongest support for LGBTT2IQ rights of any political party in New Brunswick. What happens if the NDP goes under?

Where do we go from here?

Whom can we look to for future political leadership on LGBTT2IQ issues in New Brunswick? The Lord government's record was dismal. They had to be forcibly hauled into the 21st century by the NB Human Rights Commission, the provincial courts and the federal government (see sidebar). Graham's Liberals have, on the

whole, been less than vocal. When a court decision on June 24, 2005, legalized same-sex marriage in New Brunswick, the Lord government reacted by putting forward a bill that would have allowed any civil marriage official to refuse to marry a couple on the basis of the official's personal religious beliefs. The only open opposition came from the NDP's Elizabeth Weir. Weir single-handedly blocked the bill by refusing to provide the unanimous consent required to “fast-track” it so that it could be passed before the Legislature shut down for the summer. The Liberals were notably silent.

Generally speaking one could say that when it comes to LGBTT2IQ rights, the NB Liberal MLAs are very much like New Brunswickers as a whole. A few, such as Fredericton-Fort Nashwaak's Kelly Lamrock, are long-time friends and supporters. It's almost certain that a few are less than friendly. It's worth noting that in the federal arena, three Liberal NB MPs voted against the Civil Marriage Act. Two of the same MPs were sitting in Parliament in September 2003 and voted against the Act to amend the Criminal Code (hate propaganda).

The majority in the middle are probably at least willing to engage in a friendly chat, but not necessarily well-informed. One Saint John voter described the Liberal candidate in his riding as friendly but self-admittedly clueless on LGBTT2IQ issues.

Prior to the election, a group of five members of the LGBTT2IQ community in the Moncton area requested meetings with both Lord and Graham. According to one group member, “[We] spoke to [Graham] about the Liberals' lack of position on anything GLBT. We were basically asking for the Liberals to develop a party policy surrounding equality (not just GLBT). Given it was election time, we didn't get a firm commitment to develop policy but he did promise to meet with us following the election. I think that this is a good step. The same group attempted to get a meeting with Lord and were not

able to do so.”

Another group member agreed that “[Graham] was warm and inviting and I think he has fueled (in us) a push for policy language to be introduced at the next convention. I have a feeling he might even support it.” However, the same person questioned whether or not Graham “gets” the denial of equality when it occurs “as a pervasive obstruction of access.”

If there's a need to educate Liberal MLAs on LGBTT2IQ issues in New Brunswick, who's going to provide the education? There is no province-wide group working on this task. A group called the New Brunswick Rainbow Alliance (NBRA) attempted to get off the ground in the spring and summer of 2001. However unlike Nova Scotia, New Brunswick has no

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1999-2006: The Lord Government In/Action

June 7, 1999: The Tories under Bernard Lord take control of the Legislative Assembly.

June 29, 2000: The Modernization of Benefits and Obligations Act receives the Royal Assent. By this Act, the federal government changes its definition of spouse and creates a new common-law partner definition that is non-gender specific.

January 1, 2001: Survivor benefits being paid to common-law partners under pension plans legislated by the province are cut off because New Brunswick relies on the federal Income Tax Act definition of spouse and never added the new federal definition of “common-law partner” to its pension statutes. These benefits will not be reinstated until 2004.

June 4, 2001: Nova Scotia begins allowing couples to register domestic partnerships. Asked if New Brunswick might consider doing the same, Justice Minister Brad Green replies, “It's not a policy change that the government has considered at this time.”

May 30, 2002: Charged by NDP Leader Elizabeth Weir that New Brunswick denies same-sex couples the right to adopt children, Bernard Lord replies that both single people and married couples can adopt children in New Brunswick. “The single individuals, there's no discrepancy as to what type of relationship they are in. The individuals can be living individually. The individuals can be living in a mixed relationship or they can be living in a same-sex relationship.”

June 9, 2003: The Tories under Bernard Lord retain control of the Legislative Assembly, although by a narrower margin than in 1999.

July 28, 2004: The NB Human Rights Commission rules that the province must allow a lesbian to adopt her partner's birth-child. On August 12, Bernard Lord announces that the province will not appeal the decision.

August 5, 2004: Human Resources Minister Rose-May Poirier announces that “for now” her department will apply the definition of common-law relationship used in the Family Services Act regulations to allow payment of survivor pension benefits to the people who were cut off more than three years before. She is unable to say when this policy change will be reinforced by legislative change. She also denies that the policy change has anything to do with complaints currently before the NB Human Rights Commission.

February 1, 2005: Bill C-38, An Act respecting certain aspects of legal capacity for marriage for civil purposes, receives its first reading in the House of Commons.

February 7, 2005: Family and Community Services Minister Tony Huntjens states that if Bill C-38 fails, New Brunswick will maintain its existing adoption laws, which prevent same-sex couples from adopting a “third-party child” that is not the biological offspring of either would-be parent.

June 23, 2005: Judge Judy Clendenning in Moncton rules in favour of four same-sex couples, agreeing that New Brunswick's current definition of marriage violates their rights. Her ruling clears the way for same-sex marriage in New Brunswick, regardless of the future of Bill C-38.

June 28, 2005: Bill C-38 passes in the House of Commons.

June 28, 2005: Justice Minister Brad Green introduces Bill 76, An Act to Amend the Marriage Act, in the Legislative Assembly. If passed, the Act would allow any “person who is authorized to solemnize marriage under [the Marriage] Act” – including civil marriage officials – to refuse to solemnize a marriage that is not in accordance with that person's religious beliefs.” Bill 76 receives its second reading on June 29 but Elizabeth Weir blocks its passage on June 30, the last day the Legislature is scheduled to sit before breaking for the summer.

July 20, 2005: The Civil Marriage Act receives the Royal Assent.

September 18, 2006: The Tories lose control of the Legislative Assembly to the Liberals under Shawn Graham.
