Everyday People, the Cape Breton Regional Municipality's Pride Week festival, is now a 9-day event! With added

activities to include youth specific events, and partnering with our local PFLAG chapter, our festival will begin August 8 and will run until August 16. Pride Week in the

CBRM is growing into one of the island's major summer attractions, and participants continue to return for more fun and celebrations.

Always proud to be a part of celebrating our diversity, the CBRM will raise the Pride flag at a ceremony at Sydney's Civic Centre on Friday, August 8. The festival then literally kicks off with a splash, when the frolicking starts at our beach party at 2:00 p.m. As usual, the featured beach will be disclosed on our website a few days leading up to the coastal getaway. Bring your cameras, binoculars, maybe your guitar, and of course something warm for the later hours.

Our Pride Parade on Sunday, August 10, will feature Gemini Award-winning actor, Bette MacDonald, as our Grand Marshall. The star of CBC's "The Bette Show" and "Rideau Hall," brings a

high profile to the parade and festival. Bette's Cape Breton following goes back more than twenty years, and with her guest appearances on "Made in Canada," "Liography," "This Hour Has 22 Minutes" and Mary Walsh's "Hatching, Matching and Dispatching," she has achieved national acclaim. With performances at both the Winnipeg and Halifax Comedy festivals, this lady of comedy, who critics call "one of Canada's finest comedians," will surely attract a huge crowd to both the parade and the post-parade Gathering at Louisa Field in Sydney's north end. This free barbecue, games and attractions event will be a great opportunity for everyone to meet Bette in person, as well as the Pride Week crew.

On Saturday, August 9, in partnership with PFLAG, our com-

munity's gay and lesbian youth will enjoy their first ever dance and social event in Cape Breton, which will take place at the Southend Community Centre. Although chaperoned, the youth will do their own decorating, attend the door and collect admission, as well as all the set up and take down. Money collected from 8:00 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. will go back into future youth initiatives.

On Monday, August 11, the Pride Cape Breton Society will host the inaugural Pride Friendship Memorial Baseball Championship at the Bernie MacNeil Field, the middle field next to Sydney's Bicentennial Arena in the south end. This event will allow us the opportunity to honour deceased members of our community, with

AIDS Saint John are Pride Marshals

AIDS Saint John has been honoured this year to receive and accept an invitation from Port City Rainbow Pride to be the Honourary Parade Marshals for Saint John, New Brunswick's Pride parade on Saturday, August 16.

We're even getting a new banner made, after deciding that the one we've carried in previous Pride parades just will not do. I'm sure that anyone who's ever gotten an important invitation and only then realized that they have closets full of nothing to wear will sympathize.

AIDS Saint was founded in 1987, at a time when the AIDS epidemic had thrown the gay community into crisis. Over the years, some things have changed. For one thing, the face of AIDS in Saint John has changed as the number of HIV infections among intravenous drug users increases. Another change came about after

the release of the first protease inhibitors in 1996. AIDS Saint John, like other community-based AIDS organizations, was challenged to shift its focus from helping people die with HIV/AIDS to helping them live with HIV/AIDS.

Other things have not changed. AIDS Saint John maintains as one of its core values, "the respect of human beings regardless of age, race, religion, gender, sexual orientation or socio-economic status." As Executive Julie Dingwell puts it, "we do not abide the word 'tolerate' and shoot only for equality. Stigmatization and discrimination are killers and force people into isolation."

Another constant is the strong level of both volunteer and monetary support AIDS Saint John has received over the years from the LGBTT2IQ community in Saint John. Without this support, our work would not be possible.

I learned about the relationship between AIDS Saint John and

the LGBTT2IQ community through my own experience. In the summer of 1999 I was trying to recover, with painful slowness, from a break-up. I desperately needed to make connections, but hadn't been in Saint John long enough long to know who was "safe" to talk to. I managed to locate the local PFLAG Canada chapter and went to a barbeque they were holding, where I met several people who were involved with AIDS Saint John. So I started dropping by the ASJ office when I needed to talk—or cry. It was the one place in town where I felt safe to walk in and burst into

Truro, Meet Wayves!

On June 17, nearly twenty people gathered at Neenamo's Restaurant in Truro to discuss Atlantic Canada's emerging rural rainbow communities. Organized by the Wayves collective, this "LGBT Town Hall" meeting marked the first in a series of meetings which aim to discern how LGBT media can best report and celebrate the many LGBT communities situated throughout Atlantic Canada. As an MA student of anthropology who happens to be studying rural LGBT communities, I jumped on the opportunity to tag along, and perhaps gain some valuable insights into the experiences, as well as needs,

of LGBT folks outside of Halifax. The meeting drew a diverse group of funny, friendly, and forthright individuals, and as it turns out, I was not disappointed.

The meeting took place in the restaurant's modest-sized yet well-lit dining room, whose large storefront windows overlooked part of Truro's beautiful downtown. The room boasted subtle, yet classy décor, providing a comfortable, yet invigorating atmosphere for the discussion. Moderator Angus Campbell started off the discussion with a few words regarding the intentions, as well as general rules of the meeting, ensuring respect and consideration among the circle of

attendees. Wayves publisher Dan Mackay followed up Campbell's introduction with a brief history of the magazine and its evolution over the past couple of decades. Jim Bain then touched on advertising, distribution, and circulation, leaving the remainder of the meeting open to roundtable discussion.

Although participants were hesitant to directly criticize the newspaper, many suggestions for both content and circulation were put forth. Some voiced concern for the lack of women-oriented material—particularly material regarding Nova Scotia's aging lesbian population. This sparked an inter-

Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life

Every September, communities across Canada come together to join the fight against HIV/AIDS and walk in the National Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life. Over fifty different communities participate in the Walk, which takes place from September 14-21.

Until recently, the Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life was referred to as the AIDS Walk for Life but because of a recent deal with Scotiabank and their generosity as the Walk's national sponsor, it was renamed. The first AIDS Walk for Life took place in 1986 in Vancouver, but it did not become a national event until ten years later in 1996. Since then over half a million Canadians have walked to stop the spread of HIV/AIDS and close to \$28 million has been raised to go to AIDS organizations in their local communities. The Walk not only educates people about this virus, but also improves the lives of people living with HIV/AIDS. Teams involved in partnership with the Northern AIDS Connection Society (NACS) are given the option of having fifty percent of what they raised given back to them, and they are then able to donate it to their choice of AIDS organizations or to use it for AIDS education.

The NACS is located in Truro, serving the northern Nova Scotian areas of Pictou, Colchester, Cumberland Counties and the region of East Hants. Its mission is to promote the health and well-being of persons living with and those affected by HIV/AIDS and

to assist in reducing the spread of HIV through education, support and advocacy in northern Nova Scotia. The Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life is one of their main fundraisers.

The NACS is having four walks this year: Truro and New Glasgow on September 21, Amherst and Elmsdale on September 20. The money raised will go to support and education for those living with and affected by HIV/AIDS, volunteer recruitment and training, a prison outreach program, and prevention education through presentations, and information sharing. NACS also has a resource library on hand for anyone who wants to access information.

There are currently 33.2 million people in the world living with HIV/AIDS and 62,000 of them reside in Canada. One person in Canada is infected with HIV/AIDS approximately every 2 hours. Add to that it is estimated that 27% of people who have HIV don't know that they are infected and continue to spread the virus. AIDS truly does affect us all. There is no cure for HIV/AIDS but with education and awareness it can be prevented.

To find out where the walk is being held closest to your community, visit the website at www.aidswalkforlife.ca. We hope that

one day we will not have to walk anymore, but until then the walk will do us good.

For the past five years through government funding and the Nova Scotia summer student program Northern AIDS Connection has been able to hire a summer student to coordinate the Walk for Life in their region. This year the walk coordinator for all four is Lauren Grant. Lauren will soon begin her second year at Saint Mary's University in Halifax where she is working toward a Bachelor of Commerce Degree.

Canadian Cancer Society: Oversight or... ?

Do you know that gay and bisexual men have an increased risk for certain types of cancer? Skin, prostate, lung and colon cancer are the most common among all men, but several factors put gay and bisexual men at higher risk.

I wouldn't expect any Canadian to know about these increased risks as there is no information available on the Canadian Cancer website. Try searching for "gay," "homosexual," "sexuality," etc., and all you'll find is a 40-page brochure titled, "Sexuality and Cancer: A guide for people with cancer." It's nice to see that one of the five photos on the cover is of a same-sex couple; however the lip-service stops there. In the introduction it states that the booklet is for gay or straight,

but I couldn't find any evidence to that fact. On page 15, where there are seven drawings of intercourse, including anal intercourse, none is of a same-sex couple.

Hey, Canadian Cancer Society, where's the equal representation? Don't we a) deserve some prevention information, and b) deserve some pictorial recognition as cancer survivors, too? (I want to say that we invented bum-fucking and we are the experts, but I don't have the data to back up that claim. Yes, dear reader, it's okay for you to smirk here!)

The American Cancer Society has published a pamphlet titled, "Cancer Facts for Gay and Bisexual Men: Share this with someone you care about." So, I am! It can be found at www.cancer.org - search

for "gay" and it's the first result. It is well worth the 15 minutes spent reading it.

As always, the best defences against cancer are prevention and early detection. If you haven't come out to your doctor, consider doing so or finding one with whom you feel comfortable. It's only through open, honest dialogue that health professionals can best serve us.



est in perhaps documenting and including some stories honouring our rural lesbian elders—those who helped pioneer the movement and secure the rights we have today. Suggestions were also put forth regarding the black, as well as two-spirited community, whose voices and stories are so incredibly important, but are so rarely heard within the rainbow community. Many also exhibited an interest in reading about LGBT families—particularly gay fathers—and suggested that

especially among local libraries, was therefore a crucial issue for many participants.

The majority of participants also appeared rather shocked at how small-scale the Wayves operation really is, and many seemed rather delighted upon learning that they, along with anyone else, are able—even encouraged—to make their own written contributions. As Jim Bain pointed out, "one of the keys to empowering a community is giving it a voice, a way of talking to each other." And all too often, communities outside of urban centers lack the means of obtaining this voice. However, Bain also noted



that, "...it's very unique for counties the size of Truro and Amherst, and Pictou and Antigonish, to be having Pride celebrations of their own. That doesn't happen too much in other small communities in Canada." Indeed, a voice isn't something these folks appear to be lacking, and with more contribution and distribution throughout rural Nova Scotia, it is hoped that Wayves will be able help further promote and represent these dynamic and active communities.

Wayves include a section devoted to birth, adoption, and marriage announcements. Suggestions were also put forth regarding circulation and distribution. Many participants voiced a concern regarding the availability of Wayves to local youth, and suggested that Wayves, or similar material, be circulated among local high school libraries. While, as one participant pointed, today's gay teens appear to be more accepted by their heterosexual peers, everyone agreed that isolation, along with a lack of visibility and support, continue to severely impact the lives of many rural gay teens. Circulation,

Queer women in Atlantic Canada have a new place to connect, thanks to the expansion of the popular social networking website, superdyke.com. Created in 2001 by founder Michelle Walker, superdyke.com is billed as "the ultimate free, online community for Canadian lesbians." Since its inception, the website has grown—largely by word of mouth—from its humble beginnings as a site mainly serving the Vancouver area, east to Toronto, and now to the Atlantic provinces.

Walker moved her base of operations from British Columbia to Ontario when she relocated to Toronto in 2007. She credits the success of superdyke.com with the "real life" community that has built up around it. Although the website is described as "100% lesbian run

and owned," the online community is inclusive of all queer women and transfolk. Members can create their own profiles, browse or search profiles, chat with other superdykes, send messages, view the events listings for their area, take part in polls, join in the discussion forums, or create their own blog. At last count, the site boasts more than 15,000 superdykes across Canada and around the world.

Walker's commitment to keeping the site accessible means that, while she has added "premium" features for paying members to help cover costs, superdyke.com will always have what she describes as "the not-so-limited free membership level" currently offered. A labour of love, superdyke.com depends on the support of its premium members, advertisers who pay to promote their events on the

site, and a lot of volunteer labour from local contacts in Vancouver, Toronto, and Halifax.

I came on board as the East Coast contact for superdyke.com when I stumbled across the site late last year. The website's smart design, inclusivity, accessibility, and sense of humour (check out the Super Dyke cartoon logo) impressed me. Unlike other social networking websites, Walker has designed superdyke.com to serve the regional needs of its members, thereby fostering local queer communities across the country.

It's our belief that superdyke.com has something unique to offer lesbians, transfolk, bi and queer women in each of the Atlantic provinces. Sign up for your free account or contact us to promote your local event on www.superdyke.com.

Bonjour Tom!

Me voici à Montréal. I'm here in la belle province visiting Monsieur Montréal who is taking pride in showing me the many delights of his home city. I have spent days unapologetically playing the complete tourist: gawking, browsing through postcard stands, eavesdropping on conversations in cafés, and snapping pics of statues, old buildings, fountains, street scenes and sweaty bare-chested runners in the park. Funny how even commonplace things like dogs and squirrels and sunbathers become somehow exotic in an unfamiliar place. There are many joggers and bicyclists here so the scenery is quite ... stimulating.

The park I mentioned is near where MM lives and one afternoon to escape the heat and humidity emanating like microwaves from bricks and asphalt, I took my little book and sat on a bench in the cool shade provided by the numerous trees there. I noticed shortly that there seemed to be quite a number of other men on their own, taking advantage of the serenity of the park. Very welcoming they were too, Tom. Several approached to mention that they lived near by and offered to give me a drink. And people say that city folk are not friendly! It quite restored my faith in human nature.

My new friends and I were interrupted in our cultural exchange when several city workers arrived with a truck to prune a dead branch from a large oak tree. Inevitably, this created a distraction as people gathered to watch the work. I've always said that whenever there is someone with a job to do, there will, of necessity, be someone who likes to watch him do it. This, of course, is the basis for the success of the porn industry.

MM and I have also taken the opportunity to drive into the countryside to see the beautiful pastoral land, forest-covered hillsides and many tiny villages named Saint something with enormous churches thrusting towards the sky. You know I never complain about size, Tom, but really! A bit of proportion seems called for.

The city itself is full of energy. Festivals happen all the time, there are free films, concerts, wonderful restaurants and everywhere street musicians. One lunch time there was a lovely old accordéoniste playing near the terrace where MM and I were dining on eggs Benedict, and later in the gay village a pair of young twins serenaded passers by with cello and violin. It seems almost like a setting for a film but every day is like that.

The gay village—known to everyone here simply as le village—it is even marked on the maps of the city that way – is closed to street traffic this year and so one can stroll for blocks and blocks

along Rue Ste. Catherine, absorbing all the myriad sights and sounds of gay life in Montreal. Le village is vibrant with people all day and all night with drag queen cabarets—like the one presided over by La Mado who is funny and outrageous (go figure!)—leather bars, bathhouses, a dollar store, sex shops, fine restaurants, clothing stores, coffee shops, liquor stores; you can find it all.

One gloriously sunny afternoon we stopped at Sky Pub and took a rest under an umbrella on the terrace on the top floor. We sipped our Belle Gueule beer and watched the passing parade of queer life: men and women, in couples or groups, of all ages, colours and races – a real rainbow. There were of course, a number of very nubile young men soaking up a few rays in scanty Speedos around—but never in—the rooftop pool. Forget «brown paper tied up with string» those are still my favourite kind of packages!

We've been dining out almost every night and the variety is incredible: French, Italian, Spanish—tapas, pasta, sushi and more. We waited forty minutes to get a table in the courtyard of Le Jardin de Panos, a Greek restaurant which is an institution in Montreal. My moussaka when it arrived made the wait worth every second. Of course the best part about dining out in Montréal is the preponderance of tight-panted waiters. The other night our server was a café au lait man of exquisite features and form who had me drooling before I had even seen the menu! Talk about working up an appetite.

Other nights we are content to stay home and eat a simple meal of cheese, fresh bread, olives and pâté while listening to music on the stereo. Many of the modern singers and songwriters of Québec are unfamiliar to me so I've enjoyed getting to know some of those. One evening recently, we were sitting quietly in the living room by the open door to the balcony, laughing, chatting and getting slightly tipsy.

«Shall we open another bottle of rosé?» MM asked.

I pretended to hesitate before answering, «Why not?»

We clinked glasses in a toast and then MM put on Edith Piaf and the two of us sang along with that glorious voice whose words seemed especially appropriate for me that night.

«Non, rien de rien.
Non, je ne regrette rien.»
Je t'embrasse, Tom.

A Four Letter Word is the sequel to the comedy hit, *Slutty Summer*, and viewers of that film will enjoy catching up with their favourite characters but even those who have not seen the first film will recognize these characters and circumstances from their own lives.

Peter, the waiter, has moved in with Derek and both are already wondering if they have made a mistake all the while publicly proclaiming they've never been happier. Marilyn has quit drinking, gotten engaged but is distressed to realize that she has no close women friends—aside from her AA sponsor, who made a pass at her—and so it falls to her gay friends to dress in drag and give her the bridal shower she longs for.

The key character of *Four Letter Word* is the frivolous, charming Luke (Jesse Archer) who continues to believe that life is a cabaret... or a dark backroom... or a crowded gay bar... or even a secluded section of a park. He is a flamboyant, exuberant, in-your-face gay man. Jesse works at a sex shop where his boss, Zeke, is a gay activist working with queer teens and trying to promote a wider image of the gay community than the sparkly, sex-obsessed types Luke exemplifies. Try love, he suggests, even a relationship. Luke, however, refuses to be politically correct or to accept the title, slut, for enjoying a healthy sex life. Love, slut and date, he declares are four letter words that have no place



in my life.

Then Luke meets Stephen (the charismatic and darkly handsome, Charlie David) and falls head over heels for him (the opposite of his usual position). Stephen thinks Luke is an uninteresting cliché no matter what the sexual chemistry between them. This rocky beginning turns into a bumpy comedic road as Luke and his friends explore the questions: Is there such a thing as Mr. Right or an ideal relationship? Where is the line between attraction, sexual pleasure and obsession? Why do we all search for love and how do we know if we've found it?

What makes *Four Letter Word* work so well is the tongue-in-cheek comedy talents of the ensemble cast and especially, Jesse Archer, whose character, Luke, is determined to enjoy every minute of life but who never takes any of it too seriously. The release date for this sexy, funny, romantic gay comedy is August 19.

The doctor recommended he take a year off.

He had lost a mentor, a partner, a hero, a bad cop, and a friend. But where could you ever find that person?

"It's not working."

Eureka Love stormed off the stage and into the Reflections dressing room.

For two months, she had been hosting Eureka! —a trivia-based game show—as the substitute for Five Minutes of Fame. Contestants would spin a giant wheel and buzz in to answer trivia questions on a variety of topics.

The audience had complained. It wasn't the same. How could it ever be?

They were still working out the bugs in the show, but deep down Eureka knew the audience was right. For two months, grief had paralyzed her. But she simply couldn't let her grief take the legacy of Lulu LaRude away from her horde of fans. She knew she was ready.

Hours before the show, Timmy begins his transformation. It takes most queens between three and four hours to do their makeup when they first start, with the veterans trimming that down to an hour or two. Timmy's proficiency

in art and his training in theatrical makeup help him to finish within the hour.

His face, like those of his many paintings, becomes the caricature of an elegant woman. His lips are luscious and supple, and his shadowy eyes hint at mischief.

Brad has already gone down to Reflections to set up when Tim Humphrey slips on a playful blonde wig, and Eureka Love smirks back at him in the mirror in anticipation of one hell of a show.

The opening chords of "Sweet Child O' Mine" send an aura of hope and magnificence into the souls of those who had once thought the legacy of Five Minutes of Fame was over

By the time you check your coat at Reflections Cabaret, the audience laughter fills the back of the bar and you can hear Eureka Love cracking dirty jokes. If you look up, you will find Tim Humphrey promenading around the stage in full drag—pink stilettos, a short pink dress overlapping a tiny black skirt, long black gloves and a blonde wig. His face is alive with exuberance... and makeup.

Admire the nimble way Eureka maneuvers the stage in her four-inch pumps. Notice the muscle in her legs—nearly two years of walking in heels has chiseled her calves. Unfortunately, Eureka progressed too quickly to taller stilettos, and the intense strain on her heels forces her to roll frozen bottles on her feet before every show to loosen up the inflamed tendons.

After producing Five Minutes of Fame for years, Timmy knows it by heart, so nothing needs to change. The four contestants will do their best to impress the panel of five judges to move onto the final round, where the remaining three compete for \$200 in cash. The judges give marks based on (yell this as loud and as long as you can) "Technical Merit!!!" and

Autistic Impression (not a typo, really!). Both are original Lulu LaRude touches Eureka keeps for the faithful 5MoF fans.

Tonight we are enjoying first-round performances by Alexis Stylez, April Showers, Ben Dover (Halifax's premier drag king) and a baby-faced, slender young singer named Jonathan. As an audience member, if you are feeling generous, do as two other girls do and slip a \$5 bill into Jonathan's tight jeans pocket during his performance. Laugh as Eureka fans herself when Jonathan is finished: "I'm wet to my knees, can you tell?" Congratulate April, Ben and Jonathan as they move onto the final round.

In between sets, join the audience in swarming the dance floor for whatever minutes they can steal while the DJ blasts techno music. Look around and try to find a face without a smile—you won't.

Reflections is bustling.

Some drag queens wish Eureka wouldn't run the show the same way Lulu ran it, but as Eureka puts it: "I know that show inside and out—it only runs one way."

Stephen Filek agrees. "Lulu and Tim created the show, fine tuned it, and made it what it is today... There are always reminders of Lulu within the show—and good! Who would ever want to forget the wonderful legend she was!"

Return to your seat as the new producer, Brad, prepares the crowd for the final round. The host is nowhere to be seen.

But Eureka is ready.

The wailing guitars of Guns 'N' Roses silence the chatter of the audience. The opening chords of "Sweet Child O' Mine" send an aura of hope and magnificence into the souls of those who had once

There were several Rainbow Proud members in the parade who work at the local hospital, a minister of a church, some local service agency workers, all proudly displaying their colours. Not only did we proudly display, but we also proudly passed out over 2,000 Canada Day flags, pins, bookmarks, and posters. The parade watchers were supportive and we counted five rounds of applause. Our banner

hung across a popular street in Truro to celebrating Pride Week. Since the "Flag Flap" last summer there was little media attention paid to us this year, which in a way is a good thing, but in another way have we may have been passed by, regarded as "old news."

Speaking of old news... at the last Rainbow Proud Dance in June we had almost fifty people come out to party. It was a low-key event which gave us lots of time to catch up with each other and to make new acquaintances. I was lucky to meet a couple of men from the Eastern Shore who have been partners for twenty-nine years who come to every Truro dance. One man told us stories about what it was like when he was a young man in Toronto, when if you went to a gay club you had to be careful who you picked up because he might be

an undercover police officer. He also told us about young people some of whom after coming out were sent to the mental hospital in Dartmouth to receive shock treatment as a cure.

These are important stories. They are part of our history. We do have a special, unique culture, and we have good reason to be proud. It has been said that history is written by the winners. We can only remain winners if we continue to tell LGBT generation to come our stories. It is very exciting that Halifax is celebrating twenty years of Pride parades. We also need to celebrate our neighbours who may be having their first parade, or their second or third. For those who live in Atlantic Canada we are lucky we can travel three or four hours almost every weekend this summer and celebrate a rainbow event.

Who qualifies for Al-Anon / Alateen?

What I learned

I was suffering in a verbally abusive relationship—not my first—when I attempted to join Al-Anon. I heard that it could help me with my problems. I went to a meeting and asked a woman afterward if I had to know someone who drank to join. She said I did. Disheartened, I phoned the central office in my Area and asked the same question. I received the same response.

Ten years and two more abusive, obsessive relationships later, I dragged myself to an Al-Anon meeting hoping I finally qualified. The latest relationship disaster was with a man who'd decided to stop drinking 13 years earlier. I didn't know if that meant he was an alcoholic, but I decided that had to be enough to get me through the door. I was desperate.

To my relief, no one asked me for my credentials. The woman I asked to sponsor me didn't ask me if I knew any alcoholics. Eventually I told her what had happened

ten years earlier. She shook her head in dismay and told me that if anyone came to the meetings and related, they needed to be there.

I've attended meetings and worked the Steps for more than five years now, and the program has changed my life. I still don't know if there are any alcoholics in my family, but I suppose I really do qualify because I'm in a wonderful relationship with a man who has been sober in A.A. for eleven years.

Needless to say, I welcome newcomers with open arms, and

if they ask me if they belong in Al-Anon I tell them that's up to them to decide. I encourage them to try out different meetings and tell them that if they feel like they belong, they belong.

I know now that I did qualify all those years ago. Every one of those earlier, difficult relationships had been with adult children of alcoholics. Alcoholism had most definitely and profoundly affected my life. I just didn't know it at the time.

One of my favourite memories from my childhood was going berry-picking with my grandparents in southern New Brunswick. That first bowl of still-warm field berries with a splash of heavy cream and a dusting of sugar was a sure sign that school was almost out and summery vacation was about to begin. This month I offer you a light, no-bake dessert, which is easy, light and is the perfect vessel for those beautiful berries to be

the centre of attention.

Lemon Mousse Tart with Fresh Strawberries

Ingredients (for 1 10" spring form pan)

- | | |
|--|----------------------------------|
| 2 cups graham wafer crumbs | zest of 2 lemons |
| 1/2 cup melted butter | 2 cups whipping cream |
| 16 oz cream cheese (room temperature) | 2 pints fresh local strawberries |
| 1 cup icing sugar | juice of 1 lime or lemon |
| 1 1/2 cups lemon curd (store bought is fine) | 1 cup white sugar |

Method

1. Press the crumb butter crust into the bottom of the spring form pan and bake at 350°F for 8-10 minutes, remove from oven and let cool on a cooling rack until completely cooled.
2. In a stand mixer with the whisk attachment, whip the cream to stiff peaks and set aside.
3. Then with the paddle attachment, whip the cream cheese and icing sugar on high speed until light and fluffy, then fold in the lemon curd on medium speed until the mixture is homogenous.
4. In a separate mixing bowl, fold the lemon mixture and the whipped cream with a whisk, then pour the mixture over your crust, wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least two hours before cutting.
5. During this time, hull and wash the berries. In a blender or food processor puree one pint with 1 cup sugar and the lime juice, press through a sieve to remove the seeds and set aside. Cut the remaining berries into quarters and fold the into the berry sauce.

Serving suggestions

Remove the tart from the spring form pan by running a hot butter knife along the edge of the filling and the side of the pan, then releasing the lever and pulling straight up. Cut the tart into 10 equal size portions, top with the berry mixture, a rosette of whipped cream and a sprig of mint.





This is a straight-up (no pun intended) challenge, readers: Are we (really) queer enough? I don't see us embracing our poly, trans, bi, etc., compatriots so much. This year as we rewrite local history to honour 20 years of Pride in Halifax, when I remember celebrating it here as a visitor way before then, I know I am guilty of being one of the many walking wounded still carrying in-

ternalized homophobia, transphobia, biphobia, and a whole lot of other social conditioning even while protesting it (too much?) in society at large. We cannot embrace diversity by paying mere lip service to an inclusivity that is largely illusionary outside of Reflections on a Saturday night.

I am, like all of us, a product of my environment and era, vintage Klippert and Stonewall. For those

of you who don't know who Klippert was, pardon this foray into Canadian queer history. Klippert was charged, sentenced and imprisoned for years simply because, when questioned as a witness by the RCMP in an arson investigation in the NWT, he admitted to same-sex activity with consulting adults. This was the landmark case that resulted in Pierre Trudeau declaring "there's no place for the state

in the bedrooms of the nation." Here in Canada we roll over every year and pay tribute to Stonewall, with the vast majority of queers, let alone mainstream Canadians, never having heard of Klippert. Shame on us. We have our own history, and it is not insignificant. Klippert is no longer with us, but we should be celebrating him. I'm not naïve to the fact that this happens a great deal, everywhere, but I just happened to be there to

see this specific act directed to my friend. She was oblivious to the incident but I felt hurt for her. I approached this couple and politely suggested that they not judge someone until they've walked in their shoes. This approach is what I feel should be taken for those we love and support.

I also feel that no one is without some sort of demon they are struggling against. I myself am guilty of

judging people when I was younger and quite socially ignorant. I regret my actions to this day. I've also been on the receiving end of jeers and laughs and it does not feel nice at all. This is what I felt for my friend that particular night.

I feel that it is social ignorance that causes people to judge, or misjudge, others. It could be fear and lack of understanding. Whatever the reason, folks should try to learn

At coffee recently a work colleague asked me, "Why does it always come down to sexuality? Why do you have to tell everyone you're gay?" I smiled at her, having listened to stories about what she and her husband did over the weekend. "It's 'Mo Glow," I answered. "I can't help it."

"And what's 'Mo Glow?" she asked. I defined it for her, more or less: "It's when you drip with gay, even when you think you're passing through life with your rainbow firmly stuffed under your hat." (I once had a friend who said, "Nobody knows I'm gay," to which I replied, "Honey, DEAD people know you're gay!"—That's 'Mo Glow!)

Roll back the clock and picture me in grade six. It's 1979. I have really big glasses and an Erik Estrada fixation. My best friend, L, loves Shaun Cassidy. We keep scrapbooks. I secretly wish I had L's great hair and want to live in her fabulous house. The Glow is beginning to show.

It's Career Day, and Mrs. R wants us to talk about what we'd like to do after high school. It's the classic, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" packaged as an exercise in public speaking. Each of us is to give a short presentation

to the class. Five minutes, tops. When you're 11 and timid in front of crowds, it might as well be an eternity.

One by one, my classmates take their turns at the front of the room. The boys are going to be doctors, lawyers, firemen, policemen, farmers and fishermen. The girls are going to be hairdressers, moms and teachers. L has decided she wants to be a politician, which elicits a few giggles.

Since we're going by alphabetical order, it takes some time to get to me. It's my turn, soon enough, and I stand, shakily, in front of the class. "When I finish high school," I announce in my soft, somewhat-fey voice, "I would like to be a game show host."

Dead silence, but only for a moment. Then, from the back of the room, comes the pronouncement: "Fag!" The room erupts in laughter and I slink, red-faced, back to my desk. Kids can be fantastically cruel, and my 'Mo Glow proved terribly unpolished.

But that was then, and this is now. Over the years I've had many career aspirations: game show host, actor, disco star, writer... I once wanted to be ABBA's Frida, since she was married to Benny, my first

bear crush (that's another story), and she was rich. I was also a good Catholic boy and came close to entering the seminary; it was just a phase I thankfully outgrew. All of those dreams—pipe and not—were shot through with my own particular brand of glittery bird-flipping.

I polished my Glow to a blinding brightness twenty years ago this month, when I made my final exit from the closet by coming out to my folks. It wasn't exactly what

I had hoped for—indifference would have been preferable to the storm of raw emotions on all sides. I knew there would not be immediate acceptance. Looking back, I'm surprised they didn't figure it out. However, I was in an informatics void for most of my adolescence; I learned about the sexuality from an old health encyclopedia and read that homosexuality was an aberrant behaviour and considered a mental illness. It's enough to make the gayest bottle-blond chorus boy want to paint himself grey and trudge through life under wraps. I'm thankful that at least the official positions have changed.

Twenty years and more, onward, and my 'Mo Glow is still in the "on" position. I'm glad to see that other people have theirs
