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



Transgender Diaries XVI

by Denise Holliday As with everything else in life people like to have titles and in the same vein of thought, many have little understanding of their statements. Others are confused because the meanings of words are so often abused and even completely Just like in gay commureversed.

Transphobia in its most basic sense for our purposes is a fear/ hatred of people who identify or appear to be transgendered/transsexual and/or in transition. Because most people include transgendered as part of the feared group, sometimes an obvious but often overlooked transphobic group is often missed.

People who are not acquainted with the rainbow community often include more than one group under one name assuming that they are all the same. While it is true that a transsexual is usually considered a transgendered person, it is not true that a transgendered person is always a transsexual. The largest portion of the transgendered community is made up of cross-dressers who for the most part claim to be 80% heterosexual males, and also not transsexuals. This is a group of largely het-

erosexual male cross-dressers, who have a formidable percentage of their community who suffer greatly from transphobia. Many cross-dresser groups insist that anyone found to be transsexual be

asked to leave the group. nities this often creates more levels of transphobia from people struggling for acceptance. As the gay community has striven at times to separate itself from the transgender community in the hope of receiving legal protections, cross-dress-

transsexuals. The intersexed are so wide and varied that it is almost impossible to build a consensus even within their own numbers; with some this is so, even to the point of denying even belonging to any rainbow group.

Even within the transsexual community there is a division based on surgery. Post-ops often consider themselves the cream of the crop, and post-op MtoF often use the term "complete women." While I am post-op I find that term to be as offensive as a transphobic statement. It places your gender identity on the basis of surgery and financial options. These are luxuries that many transsexuals can not afford.

ers often separate themselves from knew I was different when I was three. I am no more female in my gender identity today than I was at three years old. I simply have more awareness and understanding of my identity. With more awareness, I have managed to make renovations to improve the accommodations.

As members of the so called rainbow community we need to learn more tolerance and acceptance of ourselves before we demand it from others. Homophobia is a beast that often raises its head even in the transgender/trans-

sexual community, though often or what ever it is more a lack of understanding ourselves rather than hating someone else; and the transsexual adjusts his or her comfort zones according to personal growth and understanding.

I find it very interesting that we so soon forget the early immature struggles most of us went through, and often we fail to have patience with those who follow. I realized the other day that it has probably been over five years since I was on a chat site for transsexuals. I no longer need that support, and have failed to realize that others still do. Some of the misinformed chatter I receive from Google emphasized that to me over the last few months. Once I attended a dance where two socially unrelated women turned up wearing the same dress. It was assumed by many that they would end up in a royal battle; but instead they talked, and then moved their groups tables together and formed one larger friendlier group-a lesson we could all learn from.

Not everyone in the rainbow community is simply gay. There are lesbian, transsexual, transgendered, intersexed, heterosexual people? Many are actually a combination of two or more, and some are religious while

others have no set beliefs. But, like it or not, we all belong to the human race/rainbow community.

Labels, while sometimes needed for communication purposes, often unfortunately accomplish two things: 1. Separation leading to isolation and/or domination by larger groups. 2. A recognized way to make oneself feel superior to another human being. Macho gays often look down on effeminate gays; and post-op TS often are derogatory to un-transitioned or pre-op TS people. The presence of cross-dressers is often simply a sufferance from all other parties. Phobias, like the rainbow, come in all colours and go in all directions. Let us try and clean our house daily, in the same way we ask of the world.




they alone cannot fight the battle; HIV/AIDS is truly a community concern.

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The Nature of Queer IV -**Body Talk**

Are you are a lesbian woman with masculinized hands and a bone growth differing from heterosexual women? Or a gay man with either hyper-male or female-like hands, who is also left-handed, has a large penis, and a scalp hair-whorl that rotates counterclockwise? If your answer is yes, than you may consider yourself as a homosexual archetype, at least in the eyes of some scientists.

A large number of research studies has been conducted that addresses the question of whether sexual orientation can be linked to certain features of the human body. Some more convincing than others, some highly contradictory, and some just sheer weird.

One of the more believable studies focuses on the hands of homosexuals. Specifically speaking, it is the ratio of the second to fourth finger digit lengths (2D:4D ratio) that interests researchers. The 2D:4D ratio is thought to be determined before birth by the levels of male hormones inside the


womb (see last Wayves issue).

In general, men have lower 2D:4D ratios compared to women; the male index finger is thus usually smaller than the ring finger, whereas for women, there is not that much of a difference. Then it was discovered that lesbian women showed 2D:4D ratios that are lower than those of straight women; since they resemble the ratios of men, lesbians are said to have masculinized hands.

Gay men may have either female-like or hyper-male hands, i.e. the finger lengths of index and ring finger do not differ from each other much, or the index finger is a lot smaller than the ring finger.

Lesbian women can further be viewed as masculinized with regards to their skeleton. The bones of lesbian women seem to grow in a fashion comparable to straight men, giving rise to overall longer bones of arms, legs and hands. The converse was found for gay men, who showed feminized skeleton structures.

One study wants to bring across



evidence that gay men generally have larger penises than straight men. "Yeah, we rock!" I thought, but do we really? Published in 1999, penis measurement data from more than 5000 men were analyzed, obtained through 1938 to 1963 as part of the famous Kinsey studies. For all four penis measurements (flaccid vs. erect penis, circumference of flaccid vs. erect penis) gay men reported greater numbers; for example, the average gay erect penis is 6.46", whereas for straight men it is only 6.14". Not that big of a deal, eh? And while reading the study, I was wondering whether this really holds true or not, more so since these findings were never replicated. I could probably talk to my many old slutty gay friends, but I doubt that they did it with enough straight guys to come to a true comparative conclusion.

Lastly, the rotation of the scalp hair-whorl of men may in some instances be linked to their sexual orientation. Gay men showed more counterclockwise rotation, compared to the scalps of straight men. This feature is believed to be genetically linked to handedness. i.e. more gays are left-handed than straight men.

The significance of these studies (bearing in mind that most findings are still up in the air) is not to reveal any oddities of homosexual bodies but to search for further proof that sexual orientation is determined by our genome. But in light of recent ex-gay Michael Glatze, it is still a long way to go until people give up their beliefs that sexual orientation is a choice.

Making A Difference

David - Growing up gay in PEI

By Bill Kendrick, PFLAG Growing up gay in Prince Edward Island can be a traumatic experience. David (not his real name) found it so overwhelming he came very close to taking his own life.

"I am frustrated. I cannot live like this anymore." That is what I was thinking the night of April 2, 2005 as I walked down the stairs to see my mother sitting in front of the TV watching as images of the Pope flickered on the screen.

Tonight is the night," I thought to myself. I had failed to tell my mother innumerable times before I sat down in the chair beside her.

"Mom, I have something to tell you," I squeaked. I was nothing but a quivering mess. I was so scared and yet I knew I had to tell her.

She turned off the TV and turned to me with a concerned look on her face. "What is it?"

There was a long pause, as I tried to regain my posture and tried to form the words I wanted to say.

"I am gay."

you have no idea but the feeling is always there. I always liked boys and was rather interested to see what was in their pants. Of course I was aged 3-7 and didn't know any better and was rather innocent. I enjoyed playing with Barbie dolls and absolutely loved to bake. My friend, who is also gay, used to play house all the time and we both rather enjoyed it. Personally, I didn't like sports when I was growing up, with the exception of swimming. Just because I was like that doesn't mean that a person on a chair with a makeshift noose who might have the same interests I did is gay.

I always felt different from most of my peers and I was treated quite differently from my peers. I was bullied, called names and sometimes physically harmed, but the worst thing about it was I didn't know why. They eventually started calling me "fag" and other not dare come out of the closet. derogatory terms. Then I started to build walls around myself, since I felt they were all against me.

I felt alone, and I felt that people had told me at the time. I wanted to be what I perceived at the time to be normal. I did not want to have another aspect to me that people could make fun of; the fact

that they called me gay in such negative terms did not help. Eventually I built walls so high that It's funny. In the beginning no one could get through to me and I started to hate the world.

> My mother refers to the next couple of years as the "dark years." I went into a really deep depression. I barely smiled, cried or laughed. I barely showed any emotion at all. My marks were dropping in school and I lost most of the few friends that I had. It felt as if the world was against me at this point and I hated it. I considered killing myself quite a few times during that couple of years. I remember standing at a ledge wanting to jump or standing around my neck trying to work up the nerve to step off. I wanted to end it all. After all, wouldn't the world be better off without another "fag"?

I answered that question in grade 10 when I decided finally to accept my sexuality. Of course the world wouldn't be better but I did Everyone, it seemed, was telling me that being gay is sick and wrong. I remember sitting in grade 11 law In grade 7 I had my first crush, class and hearing the teacher bring

Shortly after I came out to accident. It was on the National Day Against Homophobia, May 17, down to the rally being held in front of the Confederation Center. On my way there a car stopped beside me. It was my brother and his girlfriend. He asked

me where I was going and I just said "I am going for a walk," trying not to say too much to him. He asked me if I wanted to go with him to the rally, quickly explaining what I already knew. I played dumb and said sure. Once there, people who knew that I was gay were coming up and saying hello. Halfway through the ceremonies, my brother and his girlfriend wanted to leave. That's when I came out to him. He left. Later that night, I was working out in my basement when my brother came down. He was in tears. He basically said to me that he is happy that I finally came out, that he knew for quite awhile and was worried about me.

Next I came out to my sister

Saturday and I was sitting at the table eating breakfast with my sister and brother. She and I had this thing where we would poke fun at being gay. For the record, I don't take "gay jokes" personally and am rarely ever offended by them. After fooling around for a bit, I told her that I am gay. She looked at me in disbelief and turned to my mother and brother. They confirmed it to her. She started to cry and hugged me. "Oh my God, I have a gay brother," she exclaimed.

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My mother from then on really pressured me to come out to my father. "He needs to know," she explained to me. Finally, it got to me and sometime in mid-July 2005 I decided to come out to my father. 2005. I decided to walk He was the last difficult person to come out to. I don't know why, but most gays find it difficult to come out to their fathers, and I was no exception. My mother neglected to tell me one thing: a few of his co-workers are gay. When I was standing at the edge of the bed and recited those infamous words he simply replied, "So what, you're still my son and whatever you do I am proud of you."

I am currently 21, and I have been out of the closet for over a year. I have never felt so happy in my life. I am glad that I came out with such positive reactions, because I do know some people are not as lucky as I am. You never know how people will react, nor should you anticipate that they will take it well. My father at first was a bit iffy on the subject and when I joked about wearing pink, he cringed. People do take time to get used to the idea, especially

Young Summer Vegetable Hodge Podge

Ingredients

1 lb baby red potatoes (washed and quarzest of 1 lemon 1/4 cup chopped fresh dill and tarragon

- tered)
- 1 lb baby carrots (washed and split)
- 1/2 lb sugar snap peas (hulled)
- 1/2 lb wax beans (hulled and cut into 1 inch pieces)

2 cups three cheese Alfredo or bechamel sauce (store bought)

Sea salt and fresh cracked pink pepper to taste

1/2 pint grape tomatoes (multi colored)

Method

1. Par cook the potatoes, carrots and beans in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and set aside. 2. In a large sauce pan over medium heat, add the sauce, zest, and all of the veggies (except the tomatoes). 3. When the sauce starts to boil, lower the heat to medium-low, cover and simmer for 10 min. Remove the cover, turn the heat up and bring to the boil. Allow the sauce to reduce enough to coat the veggies well. Girls Who Are Boys Who Like ... Review by Mary Kathryn Arnold Virginia Woolf's 1928 work "Orlando," playful, riotous, subversive and fantastical, is one of the origi-nal genre and gender-benders. A novel, a biography, a history, and with plenty of poetry to boot, "Orlando" is one Woolf's wittiest and funniest works.


Spanning hundreds of years, the novel tells the story of Orlando, a young man who comes of age as a courtier in the Elizabethan period, only to awake one morning in the 17th century to find he's become a woman. She then joins a women's group not unlike the Bluestockings in the 18th century, and completes her Methuselan journey in the 19th century, which sees Orlando married to a sexually ambiguous man, and giving birth in the novel/biography's creative climax.

on gender, creativity and history. It was written during one of Woolf's happier periods in tribute to the poet and novelist Vita Sackville-West, with whom she had an affair. The aristocratic ancestry of Sackville-West dated back to William the Conqueror and provided inspiration for Woolf's depiction of the noble (wo)man Orlando.

For those with a passion for literary history, "Orlando" can be read as a roman a clef, with the poet Orlando standing in for Vita Sackville-West, and the Russian Princess Sasha for Vita's lover, the author Violet Trefusis. Interestingly, Woolf's acquaintance with Noel Coward also provided a model for the campy, peacocky Orlando.

"Orlando" is an anarchic take though by the end, like all her works, it was a burden to her. In contrast to her usual project of depicting women's inner lives in a stream-of-consciousness style, she wrote of wanting to create a "fantasy" full of "fun" with "Orlando." Though Woolf herself felt that with "Orlando" she didn't get down to her depths as she had in her other novels, she manages to be both wholly original and completely within the Western tradition; for example, she rewrites two Italian poets, Boiardo (15th century) and Ariosto (16th century), both of whom have inspired other English writers such as Spenser ("The Faerie Queene"), and Shakespeare ("As You Like It").

Opinion **Glatze: Midlife Crisis?**

Dear Wayves:

While I was checking on a few facts for the article celebrating the naming of Judith Meinert-Thomas as Honourary Marshal for Saint John's 2007 Pride parade, I tripped over an interesting bit of news. Michael Glatze, one of the two co-marshals for our 2004 parade,

had come out as "ex-gay." My first thought was, "Oh, no, I hope that Saint John didn't do that to him!"

Further investigation reassured me on this point. Glatze did not reveal his re-orientation until July 3, 2007, in a statement published by WorldNetDaily. In this statement, Glatze writes, "I was asked to speak on the prestigious JFK Jr. Forum at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government in 2005. It was, after viewing my words on a videotape of that 'performance,' that I began to seriously doubt what I was doing with my life and influence."
