Truro, Meet Wayves!

On June 17, nearly twenty people gathered at Neenamo's Restau-Canada's emerging rural rainbow communities. Organized by the Wayves collective, this "LGBT Town Hall" meeting marked the first in a series of meetings which aim to discern how LGBT media can best report and celebrate the many LGBT communities situated throughout Atlantic Canada. As an MA student of anthropology who happens to be studying rural LGBT communities, I jumped on the opportunity to tag along, and perhaps gain some valuable insights into

The meeting drew a diverse group of funny, friendly, and forthright rant in Truro to discuss Atlantic individuals, and as it turns out, I was not disappointed.

The meeting took place in the restaurant's modest-sized yet welllit dining room, whose large storefront windows overlooked part of Truro's beautiful downtown. The room boasted subtle, yet classy décor, providing a comfortable, yet invigorating atmosphere for the discussion. Moderator Angus Campbell started off the discussion with a few words regarding the intentions, as well as general rules of the meeting, ensuring respect and the experiences, as well as needs, consideration among the circle of

of LGBT folks outside of Halifax. attendees. Wayves publisher Dan Mackay followed up Campbell's introduction with a brief history of the magazine and its evolution over the past couple of decades. Jim Bain then touched on advertising, distribution, and circulation, leaving the remainder of the meeting open to roundtable discussion.

Although participants were hesitant to directly criticize the newspaper, many suggestions for both content and circulation were put forth. Some voiced concern for the lack of women-oriented material—particularly material regarding Nova Scotia's aging lesbian population. This sparked an inter-

Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life

across Canada come together to join the fight against HĬV/AIDS and walk in the National Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life. Over fifty different communities particifrom September 14-21.

Until recently, the Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life was referred to as the AIDS Walk for Life but because of a recent deal with Scotiabank and their generosity as the Walk's national sponsor, it was renamed. The first AIDS Walk for Life took place in 1986 in Vancouver, but it did not become a national event until ten years later in 1996. Since then over half a million Canadians have walked to stop the spread of HIV/AIDS and close to \$28 million has been raised to go to AIDS organizations in their reside in Canada. One person in local communities. The Walk not only educates people about this virus, but also improves the lives of people living with HIV/AIDS. Teams involved in partnership with the Northern AIDS Connection Society (NACS) are given the option of having fifty percent of what they raised given back to them, and they are then able to donate it to their choice of AIDS organizations or to use it for AIDS education.

The NACS is located in Truro, serving the northern Nova Scotian areas of Pictou, Colchester, Cumberland Counties and the region of East Hants. Its mission is to promote the health and wellbeing of persons living with and those affected by HIV/AIDS and

Every September, communities HIV through education, support and advocacy in northern Nova Scotia. The Scotiabank AIDS Walk for Life is one of their main fundraisers.

The NACS is having four walks pate in the Walk, which takes place this year: Truro and New Glasgow on September 21, Amherst and Elmsdale on September 20. The money raised will go to support and education for those living with and affected by HIV/AIDS, volunteer recruitment and training, a prison outreach program, and prevention education through presentations, and information sharing. NACS also has a resource library on hand for anyone who wants to access information.

> There are currently 33.2 million people in the world living with HIV/AIDS and 62,000 of them Canada is infected with HIV/AIDS approximately every 2 hours. Add to that it is estimated that 27% of people who have HIV don't know that they are infected and continue to spread the virus. AIDS truly does affect us all. There is no cure for HIV/AIDS but with education and awareness it can be prevented.

Do you know that gay and bisexual men have an increased risk for certain types of cancer? Skin, prostate, lung and colon cancer are the most common among all men, but several factors put gay and bisexual men at higher risk.

to know about these increased risks as there is no information available on the Canadian Cancer website. Try searching for "gay," "homosexual," "sexuality," etc., and all you'll find is a 40-page brochure titled, "Sexuality and Cancer: A guide for people with cancer." It's nice to see that one of the five photos on the cover is of a same-sex couple; however the lip-service stops there. In the introduction it states that the booklet is for gay or straight,

That doesn't happen too much in other small communities in Canada." Indeed, a voice isn't something these folks appear to be lacking, and with more contribution and distribution throughout rural Nova Scotia, it is hoped that Wayves will be able help further promote and represent these dynamic and active communities.







Me voici à Montréal. I'm here in la belle province visiting Monsieur Montréal who is taking pride in showing me the many delights of his home city. Several approached to mention that they lived near by and offered to give me a drink. And people say that city folk are not friendly! It quite restored my faith in human

My new friends and I were interrupted in our cultural exchange when several city workers arrived with a truck to prune a dead branch from a large oak tree. Inevitably, this created a distraction as people gathered to watch the work. I've always said that whenever there is someone with a job to do, there will, of necessity, be someone who likes to watch him do it. This, of course, is the basis for the success of the porn industry.

MM and I have also taken the opportunity to drive into the countryside to see the beautiful pastoral land, forest-covered hillsides and many tiny villages named Saint something with enormous churches thrusting towards the sky. You know I never complain about size, Tom, but really! A bit of proportion seems called for.

The city itself is full of energy. Festivals happen all the time, there are free films, concerts, wonderful restaurants and everywhere street musicians. One lunch time there was a lovely old accordéoniste playing near the terrace where MM and I were dining on eggs Benedict, and later in the gay village a pair of young twins serenaded passers by with cello and violin. It seems almost like a setting for a film but every day is like that.

The gay village—known to everyone here simply as le village—it is even marked on the maps of the city that way - is closed to street traffic this year and so one can stroll for blocks and blocks

along Rue Ste. Catherine, absorbing all the myriad sights and sounds of gay life in Montreal. Le village is vibrant with people all day and all night with drag queen cabarets—like the one presided over by La Mado who is funny and outrageous (go figure!) —leather bars, bathhouses, a dollar store, sex shops, fine restaurants, clothing stores, coffee shops, liquor stores; you can find it all.

One gloriously sunny afternoon we stopped at Sky Pub and took a rest under an umbrella on the terrace on the top floor. We sipped our Belle Gueule beer and watched the passing parade of queer life : men and women, in couples or groups, of all ages, colours and races - a real rainbow. There were of course, a number of very nubile young men soaking up a few rays in scanty Speedos around—but never in-the rooftop pool. Forget «brown paper tied up with string» those are still my favourite kind of

We've been dining out almost every night and the variety is incredible: French, Italian, Spanish—tapas, pasta, sushi and more. We waited forty minutes to get a table in the courtyard of Le Jardin de Panos, a Greek restaurant which is an institution in Montreal. My moussaka when it arrived made the wait worth every second. Of course the best part about dining out in Montréal is the preponderance of tight-panted waiters. The other night our server was a café au lait man of exquisite features and form who had me drooling before I had even seen the menu! Talk about working up an appetite.

Other nights we are content to stay home and eat a simple meal of cheese, fresh bread, olives and paté while listening to music on the stereo. Many of the modern singers and songwriters of Québec are unfamiliar to me so I've enjoyed getting to know some of those. One evening recently, we were sitting quietly in the living room by the open door to the balcony, laughing, chatting and getting slightly tipsy.

www.embrem.com Review by Ralph Higgins A Four Letter Word is the sequel to the comedy hit, Slutty Summer, and viewers of that film will enjoy catching up with their favourite characters but even those who have not seen the first film will recognize these characters and circumstances from their own lives.

Peter, the waiter, has moved in with Derek and both are already wondering if they have made a mistake all the while publicly proclaiming they've never been in my life. happier. Jesse works at a sex shop where his boss, Zeke, is a gay activist working with queer teens and trying to promote a wider image of the gay community than the sparkly, sex-obsessed types Luke exemplifies. Try love, he suggests, even a relationship. Luke, however, refuses to be politically correct or to accept the title, slut, for enjoying a healthy sex life. Love, slut and date, he declares are is August 19. four letter words that have no place



Then Luke meets Stephen (the charismatic and darkly handsome, Charlie David) and falls head over heels for him (the opposite of his usual position). Stephen thinks Luke is an uninteresting cliché no matter what the sexual chemistry between them. This rocky beginning turns into a bumpy comedic road as Luke and his friends explore the questions: Is there such a thing as Mr. Right or an ideal relationship? Where is the line between attraction, sexual pleasure and obsession? Why do we all search for love and how do we know if we've found it?

What makes Four Letter Word work so well is the tongue-in-cheek comedy talents of the ensemble cast and especially, Jesse Archer, whose character, Luke, is determined to enjoy every minute of life but who never takes any of it too seriously. But Eureka is ready.



I didn't know if that meant he was an alcoholic, but I decided that had to be enough to get me through the door. I was desperate.

To my relief, no one asked me for my credentials. The woman I asked to sponsor me didn't ask me if I knew any alcoholics. Eventually I told her what had happened

That first bowl of still-warm field berries with a splash of heavy cream and a dusting of sugar was a sure sign that school was almost out and summery vacation was about to begin. A lot has changed since then, and summer vacation is nothing but a fleeting memory since becoming a Chef; however, the berries come back every year as do the warm and fuzzy feelings. This month I offer you a light, no-bake dessert, which is easy, light and is the perfect vessel for those beautiful berries to be

the centre of attention.

Lemon Mousse Tart with Fresh Strawberries

Ingredients (for 1 10" spring form pan)

2 cups graham wafer crumbs 1/2 cup melted butter

16 oz cream cheese (room temperature)

1 cup icing sugar

1 1/2 cups lemon curd (store bought is fine)

zest of 2 lemons 2 cups whipping cream 2 pints fresh local strawberries juice of 1 lime or lemon 1 cup white sugar

Method

1. Press the crumb butter crust into the bottom of the spring form pan and bake at 350°F for 8-10 minutes, remove from oven and let cool on a cooling rack until completely cooled.

2. In a stand mixer with the whisk attachment, whip the cream to stiff peaks and set aside.

3. Then with the paddle attachment, whip the cream cheese and icing sugar on high speed until light and fluffy, then fold in the lemon curd on medium speed until the mixture in homogenous.

4. In a separate mixing bowl, fold the lemon mixture and the whipped cream with a whisk, then pour the mixture over your crust, wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least two hours before cutting.

5. During this time, hull and wash the berries. In a blender or food processor puree one pint with 1 cup sugar and the lime juice, press through a sieve to remove the seeds and set aside. Cut the remaining berries into quarters and fold the into the berry sauce.

Serving suggestions

Remove the tart from the spring form pan by running a hot butter knife alone the edge of the filling and the side of the pan, then releasing the lever and pulling straight up. Cut the tart into 10 equal size portions, top with the berry mixture, a rosette of whipped cream and a sprig if mint.




