Amherst Pride Flag Vandalized

On July 8th, the phone rang and the person on the other end of the line was calling from Amherst Town Hall. Her message was direct and extremely disturbing. The Pride Flag that had been raised Monday at 12 noon had been vandalized during the night. The rope was cut and the flag cut through the centre of the orange band.

Initially my response was one of anger and disappointment. Just two days before, on the day of the flag

raising ceremony, the support from the Mayor, Town Council, as well as the citizens of Amherst, was truly memorable. Guest speakers, Mayor Rob Small, MLA Brian Skabar and Amherst & Area Chamber of Commerce President Dave McNairn all mentioned the fact Amherst and area citizens support the GLBT community. About 100 people attended the

ceremony, indicating the community at large does support equal rights.

Can't wait to see Nancy Martinez in Moncton!

On August 22, Canadian-born singer/dance diva Nancy Martinez will be performing in Moncton, as part of Pride Week 2009. I, for one, am very excited to get a chance to attend such event.

Here's some background information for those of you who (think they) may not be familiar with Nancy Martinez. For part of the 70's and even the early 80's, Nancy Martinez was mostly a backup vocalist for the likes of René Simard and Pierre Perpall (Purple Flash), to name a couple. Her first hit came in 1982, singing lead for Jade on the dance single "I'm Gonna Get Your Love," which was shortly followed by a stint as Nancy Martin on "Can't Believe." Both songs did very well in Canada and abroad. After two back-to-back hit singles, she had gained enough confidence to start recording as Nancy Martinez and was signed to the Matra label, distributed by Unidisc, already home to such discotheque greats as Lime, Carol Jiani and Geraldine Cordeau. That new contract lead to her first album entitled "Lay It Down," in 1983. That is also when I first took notice of Martinez, thanks to the lead single "So Excited." Great song. Great memories of my childhood. God, I'm old!

By the following year, Nancy had

married Allen Harris and together, they recorded the hit single of the summer of 1984, "Sunshine Reggae/La vie en rose." In 1986, she reached the American majors by signing with Atlantic Records. Her beat was slightly changed and she became part of the Miami-freestyle dance craze, along with countless others, including Company B (Fascinated), The Cover Girls (Show Me) and Exposé (Come Go With Me). Her hit "For Tonight" became one of the best selling dance 12" singles in the U.S. and still is, to this day. The big difference between Nancy Martinez and the many other freestyle artists of the 80's was her talent. Although their music all sounded very similar, Nancy was the only one with the pipes, which is why she's still recording new material in 2009.

In 1990, after a string of international dance hits, Nancy came back to Canada for a change of pace and to give birth to her daughter Zoë. Along with the move came two successful francophone albums, the second of which contained two songs co-written by none other than Lara Fabian ("I Will Love Again"). A few years later Nancy Martinez was prominently featured on Celine Dion's "Falling Into You" album, singing background vocals and choruses on "Your Light."

By 2003, Nancy had released a pop/rock album (Birds in the House) and worked on recordings by Garou and Dieppe's own Denise Murray. Ready for a new challenge, she then released two jazz albums, "Downtown" and "Live." She also became a vocal coach and greatly helped putting young Nikki Yanofsky on the map. As if that wasn't enough, she was featured on rapper K-Maró's "Femme Like U" and "Crazy," both monster hits in French Canada and Europe in 2004.

Her latest dance single, "Not Guilty," dates back to 2006 but, no worries, she's still working very hard. She's performing at the House of Jazz in Montreal on a regular basis and has been taking part in Vénus, a live dance and disco show, featuring Patsy Gallant, Johanne Blouin and Élisabeth Blouin-Brathwaite, since last fall. This summer alone, Nancy will be recording 4 tracks for a big band, a new jazz album and even a dance/pop song. As far as I'm concerned, she's more than overdue for a dance album and comeback. She's still got a great voice for it and looks better than ever. If anything, a best-of compilation including updated versions of her biggest hits would be a viable option.



Whether or not you know Nancy Martinez and her music, make sure you attend her post-parade rally performance on August 22 at the

Riverfront Park, in Moncton, and get ready to shake your groove thang! You won't be disappointed.

Founded in Alberta in 2004 by Kris Wells and Andre Grace, Planned Parenthood – Newfoundland and Labrador Sexual Health Centre is bringing Camp fYrefly for the first time to Atlantic Canada. With support from the Community Youth Network – St. John's, and in partnership with Camp fYrefly - Alberta, this educational and empowering youth retreat will be taking place from Aug 17th – 19th, 2009 at the beautiful and tranquil Environmental Education Centre, Salmonier, Newfoundland.

Camp fYrefly – NL will bring together lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans-identified, two-spirit, intersex, queer, questioning, and allied youth from across Atlantic Canada for three days of empowering workshops, out-door nature activities, and networking opportunities. It is an opportunity for youth to learn how to enable and

implement changes in their schools and communities, to build strong social support networks, and to have fun in a supportive, non-judgemental environment. Nestled in an old growth boreal forest, the Environmental Education Centre provides the perfect setting for uninterrupted personal growth, reflection, and healing.

It is with a great deal of reluctance that the Board of Directors of Port City Rainbow Pride Inc announces the cancellation of Pride Week, 2009. "The Board recognised that too many events had not yet been confirmed and we could not provide the high quality Pride celebration the community and the Region of Saint John have come to expect," said Don Uhryniw, President of Port City Rainbow Pride Inc. "We believe that the community deserves a first rate celebration and have decided to turn our energies to planning next year's event.

We will take this opportunity of broadening our support within the community and identifying groups, businesses and individuals who will be able to assist all of us in celebrating diversity."

"Port City Rainbow Pride Inc. looks forward to expanding our partnerships and building our membership base over the next thirteen months as we prepare to celebrate pride in conjunction with the 225th birthday of Canada's oldest incorporated city. Members and allies of the LGBT (lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, trans-identified) community from across Canada will be invited to our homecoming being held the week of August 7 to 15, 2010 in the Greater Saint John Area," stated board member Mack MacKenzie.

Port City Rainbow Pride Inc. has hosted the annual Pride Week Festival for the Greater Saint John community since 2003. It has participated in the annual Saint John Santa Claus Parade, Skate to Care for Mental Health, the AIDS Saint John annual Walks for AIDS and the Rainbow Peace March to commemorate the International Day Against Homophobia and Transphobia, as well as co-hosted renowned guest speakers such as Olympic gold medalist Mark Tewksbury, criminologist Douglas Victor Janoff and author Alex Sanchez. The organization has also contributed to both the Saint John Free Public Library and Atlantic Canada's largest LGBT Free Lending Library (located in Saint John, NB).

Another flag was not available, so the torn part of the flag had to be replaced as well. Within the hour the flag rose again at Amherst Town Hall. This experience leaves one with a feeling of devastation. However, as soon as the flag was raised again we felt relieved and determined to not let the culprits get the best of us. Our Pride week continued on with three more events: the GLBT Parenting Workshop, the Pride Dinner & Dance and the Pride Family Picnic. We continue to make certain our Queer community thrives no matter the seriousness of the problems we face.

Research Study Participants Wanted

The NS Advisory Commission on AIDS is funding a study investigating implications for policy and practice regarding HIV testing and counselling in Nova Scotia. Specifically they are interested in hearing about people's experiences of HIV testing in the province. The study is open to everyone regardless of sexuality or gender.

If you HAVE or HAVE NOT been tested for HIV in Nova Scotia in the past 12 months (whether your test result was HIV+ or not), and are between 15 and 65 years of age, you may be able to take part in a private and confidential one-on-one interview with a member of the research team.

The interview will take approximately 1.5 hours and a \$15 honorarium will be provided. An Openly Gay Teenager's Experience

I have always known I was attracted to boys. I didn't quite know what it was, or that it wasn't something most boys did. But I always knew. I can remember back to first grade playing "kiss-chase" with the girls. Yet I was chasing WITH the girls after the boys

For many people who were brought up thinking they were straight, it can come as quite a surprise to realise that they're attracted to people of the same gender. Sometimes something might happen to make you suddenly aware of these feelings – or you might have become aware of them slowly, over a long time.

It can sometimes seem like there's just too much to deal with – but don't worry, you don't have to make any decisions right now, and feelings often make more sense after some time has passed.

Being gay is not a decision, like I said. It is just life. It is same way straight people are born straight. Now there are some people, guys and girls, who just jump up and decide to have sex with the same sex and the opposite sex, just for fun. But being truly gay isn't like that, as a matter of fact, most people that are gay, when they meet someone of the same sex that is gay, the first thing in their mind isn't, "Ooh, he (she) is hot, I want to have sex with him (her)." Notice I said most: with some people though, that IS the first thing in their mind. My point is, this is your life, and although some people say that

they may decide to live out their life "straight," you can't change who you are, though you can fake it, marry a woman, have kids, you will still never truly be happy, and you will still have thoughts about the same sex.

I have realized and comprehended all of this at a very young age. I know I was gay and attracted to the same-sex at the age of 7. I was brought up as and acted like a straight male, but inside I knew. As time went by and I moved to a new area and went to a new school things started to get rough. I heard "fag" all day long. When I finally came out, it was like I was a new person, a new person with new reasons to get picked on and beat up.

When I came out to the public at school, it was like I was invisible, not one person knew me. As the days and weeks past, the first school dance was announced. I used to go to all the dances and I was actually popular. I can remember that night like the back of my hand, I walked into the gym and first thing everyone did was stare and talk to the person next to them. I stood in the corner for three long agonizing hours as all I could do was cry. Finally the dance was over. As I walked home thinking of the night all I could hear was "fag!" and as I kept walking, four men came out and with no hesitation beat me up. As vaguer words were being used and feet coming at my face I picked myself up and ran home. After being seen


what was done by my grandmother I was rushed to the hospital and there I spent three days in recovery.

Schooling then started to get bad, I started to miss a lot of time and had a lot of emotional problems that only I knew about. Before all this happened living in a rough area was not the best, people shooting and beating up people for no reason and the police sounds were honoured as the national anthem. You could hear the people yelling and screaming as you tried to relax and sleep from a long exhausting day. Now with me being openly gay there is more spot light and attention attracted to me.

So after the few rough and sad days of first being openly gay I figured I would bring my boyfriend home to meet my family. After getting off the metro bus and walking down the area I lived in was just so "ghetto-looking" that my boyfriend Dylan grabbed my hand. Walking side by side down the street all we could hear from people playing ball was "faggots." We looked at each other and just kept going. The looks and comments that we have got from people were so bad and so

rude that I am having second thoughts about bringing my boyfriend back to the area I live in for both his and my protection.

I walk to the mall or to the store and there people standing by the store staring and laughing at me as I mind my own business and walk into the store. "Fruit" is all I can hear as I casually walked out the store. I wake up in the morning on a week end and get the bus and all I get is looks and I can read what there thinking. I sit down and the person next to me moves. Living in a rough area in Halifax is not the best especially when you're an openly gay teenager as me. I have come to realize that I know who I am and I love myself and for those who got a problem, it's only them. No matter how long how old or where I live, the discrimination will never end, and with me understanding that is how



I survive in this cold and agonizing world as others put me down with their problems.

On every side were gleaming accessories – plates, crystal, small silver bibelots, brocade toss cushions (no copper) and casually strewn on tables were magazines on interior design. It was so heavenly I had to focus on regulating my breathing and keeping my nipples from poking through my silk shirt. And the furniture was all made of glowing dark wood, beautifully carved and polished. We spotted several other male couples which only confirmed our initial impression that this will be the store where "our people" will shop.

But nothing is perfect as we discovered when

we came upon a bedroom suite of pine in what is commonly called "country style." Now, I admire rough-hewn ruggedness in men, as you know, Tom, but this furniture looked like the trees had been cut that morning and there was still bark clinging to it in some places. I certainly would not risk my 400 thread count copper sheets on a log bed oozing sap. Both of us stood there aghast, sadly shaking our heads, vainly trying to imagine where such a monstrosity might look appropriate... besides a bonfire.

Fisherman's Freud and the Anthill have a cottage by the bay and it is an unpretentious and comfortable, put-your-feet-up kind of place but it also has some style and class – even if they haven't gotten around to putting a door on the bathroom yet which requires me to sing show tunes very loudly to indicate "occupado" and to cover up any other small noises which might occur – but they certainly wouldn't give house room to a bed that had been chainsawed out of tree stumps.

Good intentions are not always enough. Like when I was first coming out. After my very first sexual encounter with another man, the next day I...I think the clinical psychological term is "freaked out." Panic arrived in a big way: Will he want a return engagement? What do I do if he does? What does it mean if he doesn't? Could I lose my job? (This was before legal protection.) Does this mean I'm gay, for sure? Did I remember to hide my ABBA albums? I never should have bought that Larry Kramer novel at the bookstore!

I worked myself into a state, Tom. During a fleeting rational moment, I called the local mental health clinic. I met with a motherly social worker who calmed me down and then gave me the worst/best advice ever. "We're not supposed to say this but you're young and I hope you might at least try to meet a nice young woman." And in that moment, everything clarified for me, Tom. I knew I didn't want to meet a nice woman. I began to accept my being gay and knew that somehow, someday that was going to be okay.

"Clean Testing" Kit: Inaccurate

Health Canada is advising Canadians not to use Clean Testing HIV Home Test Kit, or any HIV home test kits, as these are unlicensed medical devices and may provide false test results.

The Clean Testing HIV Home Test Kit, available online at cleantesting.com, is promoted as a self-test kit to determine whether an individual has been infected with Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). This kit is unlicensed and has not been evaluated by Health Canada for safety and effectiveness. Inaccurate test results may fail to indicate HIV in an infected individual, or indicate HIV when none is present.

Under the Medical Devices Regulations, home HIV test kits require a device license issued by Health Canada before they can be advertised or sold. It is illegal to advertise or sell unlicensed medical devices of this class in Canada.

Currently, there are no HIV test kits that have been authorized for sale for home use in Canada.

Health Canada has requested that Clean Testing stop sale of the device and notify all customers not to use the kit. Health Canada will continue to monitor the situation and take appropriate action to mitigate the risk. Health Canada advises Canadians not to purchase these products from the Internet or from any other source.

Patients who are concerned about their HIV status should talk to their doctor. Patients that have used these test kits should also consult with their doctor to evaluate the need to con-

duct proper testing. Health Canada reminds Canadians that home test kits are not a replacement for professional health care, and that patients who have used a home HIV test kit should contact their physician for follow-up testing and counselling.

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HPV – Coming Soon to an Opening near You

Farrah Fawcett's recent death has brought anal cancer into the media spotlight. There is growing evidence that our population should receive periodic anal Pap smears to screen for anal cancer, but many physicians are not convinced.

Are you familiar with the bus ad, "Had sex? Get a Pap test!" I'm waiting for the updated version, "Had oral, vaginal or anal sex, with or without a condom? Get a Pap test!" That's right. If you've been playing "Hide The Sausage" or "Tongue In Cheeks" or any other skin-to-skin disappearing acts (toys and fingers aren't exempt), then it's important for you to get your little pink smudge checked periodically. If you're HIV+ then the latest recommendations are

annual Paps, otherwise every second year. No matter your HIV status, if you've had genital warts it's especially important to have a Pap.

You may already be familiar with *HPV is the most prevalent sexually transmitted viral infection in the world*

the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) due to the amount of press in the last couple of years. There are over 100 different strains of it, most considered harmless, but some are responsible for genital warts; cervical and anal cancer. HPV is the most prevalent sexually transmitted viral

infection in the world. More than half of all gay men carry this virus without even knowing it. Some of us can clear it through our own natural immunity.

Anal Pap smears are not available in Atlantic Canada, yet. Some people are working behind the scenes to make them happen as they are available in other parts of the country. Part of the challenge is finding a lab which can process them, but some anonymous clinics in Toronto and Vancouver do accept tourists.

The incidence of cervical cancer has been greatly reduced thanks to the Pap smear and hopefully gay male arses will see the same benefit as it's a relatively easy, painless procedure. The smear test is said to be more

effective than your doctor's digit as he/she can't feel dangerous areas until they have grown large and require more radical treatment. The same can be said about a scope because a Pap smear can find precancerous cells before they are visible to the naked eye. (For those who enjoy a good digital rectal exam, don't fret, your doctor's finger will still be loyal as a DRE is multi-purpose.)

But just how serious is the problem? Data in 1989 suggested that anal cancer was 10 times more common in gay men than straight men. More recent studies calculate anal cancer to be 35 times more common in gay men than straight men, and between 70 and 140 times more common

in HIV+ gay men. Additionally the American Cancer Society estimates that HPV may be responsible for up to 30% of the 35,000 new cases of oral cancer expected to be diagnosed this year.

A vaccination is available nationwide for young women aged 12 to 26. Good news. A clinical research trial from the University of California at San Francisco suggests that Gardasil® is almost as effective in men as it is in women.

But perhaps the entire debate over anal paps is moot as a new HPV DNA test has been announced. Currently it is only available for women in the United States, but if it proves reliable and cost-effective, we may all have access to it.

NACS News: The Hepatitis C Aware Project

On June 15, 2009, the Northern AIDS Connection Society (NACS) launched its new "Hepatitis C Aware Project" with funding from the Public Health Agency of Canada.

Hepatitis C is a virus that usually silently attacks your liver. Many people infected with the Hepatitis C Virus (HCV) have no symptoms at all. In fact, most people don't know they have the disease until liver damage is discovered, often decades later.

HCV is one of five identified hepatitis viruses which cause the liver to become inflamed and interferes with its ability to perform its 500 functions. Hepatitis C is generally considered to be among the most serious of these viruses. Over time it can lead to liver cancer, liver failure or cirrhosis — irreversible and potentially fatal scarring of the liver.

There are varying degrees of risks, activities and circumstances that can expose you to the HCV, among them:

- People who received a blood product prior to June 1990
- Sharing injection drug equipment
- Sharing straws, etc, for snorting drugs
- Sharing personal items such as a razor, toothbrush, or nail clippers that could house minute amounts of blood
- Piercing and tattooing in unsterilized environments
- Blood being present in vaginal or seminal fluid during unprotected sex with a partner infected with HCV

No vaccine for hepatitis C has been developed. In addition to the standard two-drug treatment, researchers continue to develop other therapies to stop the growth of the virus and prevent long-term complications, such as cirrhosis and cancer, from developing.

Did you know?

- More than 5,000 Nova Scotians are living with hepatitis C.
- In Atlantic Canada, hepatitis C is 10 times more common than HIV/AIDS.

The Hep C Aware Project of the Northern AIDS Connection Society

is about raising awareness, providing educational information, working in collaboration with our partners, and building supportive networks. Additionally a series of focus groups and one-on-one interview sessions will be conducted to collect information regarding HCV services and issues in Northern Nova Scotia (area of East Hants, Colchester, Cumberland and Pictou counties). The project will have a dedicated staff person until March 31, 2010.

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We've Come a Long Way Baby... or Have We?

As a Canadian and a lesbian I am celebrating this year. It's been forty years since the decriminalization of homosexuality. I was only 12 when Pierre Elliott Trudeau made his famous statement, "The state has no place in the bedrooms of the nation." This opened up the closet door for many to begin lobbying for equal rights. Today in our country we enjoy the freedom they fought for and the right to be free from fear. Today we can marry the person we love. Most of us are protected in our workplaces; many are out to our family and friends and are respected and valued in our communities. I guess you could say we have it all. Life is great, unless of course, you are a student.

Our education system appears to be doing everything for everyone except our LGBT population. If you are queer and still in high school feeling not worthy enough to be discussed in class tends to be the message communicated. This is especially true if you live in Alberta. How many of us would go to work tomorrow if we felt afraid to walk down the corridor or go to the washroom? How many of us would accept insults to our dignity on a daily basis or ignore being pushed into lockers or spit upon?

The fact is living with fear is the reality for a lot of our LGBT youth. The results of Egale's phase one of The First National Survey on Homophobia in Canadian Schools speaks loud and clear. Seventy-five percent of out LGBT youth feel unsafe in school. This is an extremely disturbing statistic. What about the rights of ALL children to a safe learning environment? Over the past ten years enormous efforts have been made by school boards to ensure that schools create safe and respectful school environments. I guess that means all except LGBT.

In Canada children are suppose to feel included and represented in their school curriculum. Provincial education ministries across the country have worked hard to ensure that the various minorities are represented in the curriculum. Reviewing the curriculum in Social Studies here in this province I see all minorities

represented except the LGBT minority. This is about Human Rights, the rights of our LGBT students and teachers, and our LGBT families.

The passing of Bill 22 in Alberta really ensures that discussing queer topics in school has returned to the Stone Age. One can only imagine the impact this will have on the lives of

LGBT youth.

I am so pleased with the extreme contrast between our conservative government and the one in Alberta. It's like chalk and cheese, night and day, from one extreme to another. Our minister of education wanted the survey implemented in all five school boards whereas in Alberta not one board participated. YEAH for us!

The Egale survey reached many isolated communities and since last year many schools are looking for student workshops on homophobia.

I was thrilled when the Director of Planned Parenthood, Costa Kasimos, asked me to develop a workshop for students that they could use in schools. In the spring Costa emailed asking if I would be interested in traveling to the west coast of the province to do workshops on homophobia. For me it was an opportunity to get back into the schools and I wanted to know what the situation

was really like.

The first week in May we headed out on our queer road trip. Costa, Rob Sinnott, who runs a LGBT youth group, and myself took "Making Queerness Visible" on the road. I have to give the boys credit for the name, which I think is perfect. They were fabulous and I was so glad to be

a part of the tour, especially when we encountered homophobia. Such as when a guidance counsellor explained that there were no homosexuals in the school or the community. We smiled and explained maybe there were no out queer students because they felt afraid to come out. After we discussed with the students the many homophobic comments heard daily in the corridors she had a better understanding as to why students may fear being out in school. Another guidance counsellor greeted us saying he felt a little upset about the workshop. Based on his experiences of growing up in a very religious family, he believed the grade 7 and 8 students would be easily influenced. He continued and I knew something outrageous was coming.

He feared that a hundred students would come out that evening! He stayed for the presentation so hopefully he did learn that we just don't

turn queer overnight.

We did sixteen presentations in five days and the most rewarding experience occurred when a student approached us to say, "Thank you, it's the first time I ever heard anything positive about queer people." One young woman came to all of our presentations hanging on to every word. For me, I realized just how much these workshops are needed.

In every school we heard the same thing, that Egale's survey is correct, in our education system homophobia is rampant!

We know there is much work to

be done. As I've stated before this is Egale's most important journey.

Some LGBT youth have shown remarkable resilience in extremely difficult circumstances. In the absence of social acceptance and lack of integration into the life of their schools they manage to survive. For me, I cannot stop wondering about the youth who are not able to confide in teachers, complain to principals or ask their parents to intervene on their behalf.

They will continue to walk on eggshells until graduation.







As I write this article it is early July and I am wondering if the sun and summer weather will ever come. After 3 solid weeks of gray damp cool weather, all I really want to write about is preserves, or hearty stew like one would do at the end of summer going into the fall. However I shall keep the faith and pray to the sun gods for fairer weather very soon. So in keeping with a summer theme, let us bake up a sweet treat from the orchards. This peach melba crisp is divine, and you can baked it outside on your covered gas grill, so no need to heat up the house with the oven on for an hour.

Peach Melba Crisp

The topping:

1/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup butter
1/4 cup rolled oats
1/4 cup ground pecans or almonds

The filling:

3 cups peaches (peeled, pitted and sliced into wedges)
1 cup whole fresh raspberries
1/3 cup white sugar
1 Tbsp corn starch
2 tsp peach schnapps -pinch salt

Method


Method 1. Combine all of the ingredients for the topping and pulse in a food processor just until the ingredients are combined to make crumble topping. 2. Toss the peaches and raspberries in the white sugar, corn starch, salt and schnapps, and fill the bottom of a 8"x8" ceramic or glass baking dish. 3. Lay the topping evenly over the entire surface of the fruit and place the dish on the top rack of your 350F pre-heated gas grill. Bake with the cover down for 35-45 minutes until the topping is dark golden brown and the fruit juices are bubbling around the edges. Remove from the grill and let cool in the baking dish for 20-30 min before serving.

Serving suggestions

At the restaurant I would serve this crisp with a home made nutmeg frozen yogurt, but at home I like sweetened whipped cream or a high quality vanilla ice cream. Enjoy!


Nothing ruins a vacation like murder. When Bradford Fairfax travels to a clothing optional resort in Key West all he has on his mind is relaxing by the pool with his hunky boyfriend, Zach, and maybe working on his tan during his New Year's break. The handsome twosome meet James Quentin Ashley Vanderbilt III, a fey creature with a talent for drag and singing soprano opera arias and who confides one night, after an affecting rendition of the suicide song from Madama Butterfly, that his father wants him dead. Brad and Zach dismiss the story as attention seeking histrionics, until James ends up dead.

Brad, who is a special agent for an international company – think a sexy James Bond with gay sensibilities – finds he must mix his personal and professional lives as he searches for the killer. Aided by Zach, he sifts through the possible suspects: the pool boy cum masseur whose talents seem to lie in his Speedo rather than his hands, a gay sheriff, a New Zealand business man who has an un-gay vibe, the owner of the resort who behaves like a shrill Shelley Winters, a lesbian who runs a wildlife preserve, a Russian bodyguard and, of course, the dead man's father and brother who are not averse to wielding their considerable financial and political power to obstruct the investigation.

Death in Key West is a suspenseful, campy, rollicking ride with the perfect blend of serious and silly. The mystery is well-crafted, the writing assured and the comedy relief is full of originality and wit.

Jeffrey Round was educated at Dalhousie University and now resides in Toronto where he is a writer, director and playwright and the author of the critically acclaimed novel Cafe of Bones. Death in Key West is the second in the Bradford Fairfax mystery series which began with P-Town Murders.

While Russell Quant is flying home from Hawaii and trying to absorb the shock that he has received

a marriage proposal, he is distracted from these personal concerns by his seat mate, an elderly, odd-looking man that he privately calls Mr. Magoo. Once on the ground two surprising events happen: one, Mr. Magoo is murdered and two, Russell discovers that Mr. Magoo has slipped a handwritten map and list of clues, as if for a treasure hunt, into Russell's pocket. It very quickly becomes clear that someone else wants this list and map and is willing to kill to get them. Quant realizes that the only way to

thwart the killer is to solve the clues and find the "treasure" even when this leads him deep into Saskatchewan's sometimes unsavoury past and may put his friends and family at risk.

Aloha, Candy Hearts is the sixth in the Russell Quant series of mysteries, and like all its predecessors, it does not disappoint. The now familiar Quant insouciant wit and humour is here in strength as is the well-constructed plot. From the first novel, Amuse Bouche, Bidulka demonstrated his skill in creating realistic scenarios and writing the kind of dialogue that amuses the reader as well as moving the action along. But, what lifts Bidulka's books a level above other well-crafted mysteries is the human element he has created in the character of Russell Quant. With each book, Quant has grown

and developed and, while each novel may be read as a stand alone mystery, for those of us who became devoted fans early on we have watched Russell move from a hard-headed PI who attempted to hide his heart to a much more vulnerable human being. We have become Russell's friends – or, at least, Bidulka has created that lovely illusion. We rejoice with him on his successes, we grieve with him when he is troubled and when, as in Aloha, Candy Hearts, he is uncertain about choosing his future we share in his very human dilemma of balancing his own happiness against not wanting to hurt those he loves.

Aloha, Candy Hearts delivers on many levels and is the best addition yet to what is already a very strong series. It is a novel full of intelligence, wit and heart. Bidulka continues to top himself.

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Cancel Pride?

Do we really need a Pride parade to let people know we are here and we are queer? This question comes up every year as it gets closer to the event. Let me ask you this. I've heard people say, "I think the parade should go on but why do people have to be so outrageous?" Is this person talking about the drag queen in her thong, the leather boy with his bare ass in his chaps, or the dyke who goes topless? I'm sure any of



these would offend someone. What would you replace this with? I think the point is to shock people into paying attention, and frankly who would come to see it. And let me remind you that it is not illegal in Ontario for women to go topless. Let me paint a picture for you: a guy walking down the street on a hot summer day with his large man-boobs bouncing with every step he takes. It's not illegal. So, why is it so for women? You might say what place does this have in a pride parade? Pride has always been about creating an environment of equal

rights for everyone. It's also about diversity and the right to express it.

Ok, have I pissed you off? Good, now I have your attention. See how that works? And it does work. It brings the issues to the table and makes you ask questions. It helps you decide where you stand. You then have to come to grips with your opinion and how you will respond. Halifax Pride is now the fourth largest in the country and received Hallmark status with a cash award of of \$25,000 to go towards this year's celebration. With this year's theme, "Breaking Down Walls and Building Bridges," we can construct a new image of diversity in Atlantic Canada. And, you know we're all about bridges.

Tom of Finland: XXL

If you're a gay man of any age and you've not heard of the artist Touko Laaksonen, otherwise known as Tom of Finland, even in passing, then you must have been living under a rock for the past five decades or so. If you're one of those rare few who've not heard the name, you most certainly have seen the art. The flawless faces. The impossible bubble-butts. The perfect bodies. The uniforms. And, of course, the cocks. I've always said cocks in porn come in three sizes: huge, gigantic, and Tom of Finland. "XXL" has an abundance of all this and more.

Tom of Finland is arguably the creator of the contemporary gay macho archetype.

At a time when homosexual men were the weak sisters of society, he envisioned a different kind of queer: manly and potent, the alpha male equally comfortable with dominating other men with his cock while taking a big one up the ass. His unique brand of hyper-masculine has defined entire generations and sub-cultures of gay




men. The look and feel of the art has been emulated in style by visual artists and photographers and in practice by devotees of the muscular and masculine.

I first encountered the art of Tom of Finland as a university freshman, coming to terms with my

it on and getting off in a public park

under the moonlight. It was my first encounter with the gay as fully-realized masculine and the visual before me was a sharp slap across the face—a pivotal moment in my life, one which I have never forgotten. Each page of "XXL" took me back to the very beginning of my awakening.

Divided up by decade, beginning with the 1940's and



sexuality and coming out of the closet, in the mid-1980's. While ensconced in an overstuffed chair in a quiet corner of the library, leafing through a book on gay history I flipped to a page full of painted sailors, leather men and cops, all of them getting

continuing through to the 1980's and including a section with rare and lost (and reconstructed) work, the artist's career is carefully traced with art representative of the period and essays by such creative luminaries as Camille Paglia, Armistead Maupin, Todd Oldham, Jim French, John Waters and more. As is common with Taschen, the text is presented in English, French and German, giving the book an international feel and relevance. The book is introduced by Durk Dehner, president and co-founder of the Tom of Finland Foundation. Photos from the artist's life are liberally sprinkled throughout.

As an electronic book, "XXL" is stunning; I can only imagine how the content pops off the actual printed page.

Make no mistake; this book is not a Tom of Finland primer. At nearly 700 pages "XXL" is a big, meaty tome, spanning the entire compass of Laaksonen's career. It's jammed full of the good stuff, lovingly assembled and edited by Dian Hanson—one of her earlier efforts, the fabulous "Big Penis Book," sits proudly on my coffee table. I believe this authoritative study of Tom of Finland's work will be a treat for long-time fans, and its long shelf life will definitely garner new fans of the master's work. Worth every penny.

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The Last Word

Freedom To/Freedom From

I confess I'm a news junkie. At any given point I can be found with my nose in a newspaper or reading blogs or checking Twitter or listening to the radio or watching Newsworld. I admit to watching the local CBC news, then switching over to the Toronto news on CBC's high-def channel, then watching the whole thing again on the National.

I like to keep up on what's happening in the world. We live in a media-saturated culture with a short attention span where a devastating plane crash is news for a day until Perez Hilton makes a stink about being smacked around by will.i.am's manager. I never lack for the juicy bits.

June was a doozy of a month, with high-profile celebrity deaths, man-made disasters and yet another Republican sex scandal. (I submit that Michael Jackson did Farrah Fawcett a round-about favour by dying on the same day, therefore moving the

media circus away from her casket and around his.) July is shaping up to be another interesting month, having lead off with two diametrically-opposed headlines this Pride season: "India Decriminalizes Gay Sex" and "Police Raid at Fort Worth Gay Bar Lands Patron in Hospital."

According to a recent report released by the National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs, anti-gay hate crimes are on the rise in the United States and are at their highest level in ten years. This comes at a time when we gays are (supposedly) enjoying greater levels of equality and more freedom to be than in the past. Some say the cause is the passing of same-sex marriage laws in more states that threatens the right-wing nut jobs into violent action; others say there's just more reporting going on, that people feel it's their right and duty to speak out when it happens.

As for me, I say it's never been a better time to be gay and yet it's never been a worse time. We have

unprecedented freedoms to be who we want to be, to live our lives as we see fit. Unfortunately, many of the things on our "freedom to" list are also balanced on a "freedom from" list. Having put in all the work to secure at least some of our basic

societal equalities we should be able to enjoy freedom from oppression and violence, be it verbal or physical. That's "we should be able." Not "we are able." On the fortieth anniversary of the riots at the Stonewall Inn a gay bar in Fort Worth, Texas, was raided by local police, ostensibly looking for public intoxication, ending up knocking heads. The story made the New York Times and after initial claims that bar patrons made sexual advances towards the officers were

backpedalled, there is now a full-scale investigation underway to find the cause.

On the other side of the pond, India's GLBT's have reason to celebrate this Pride season. After an eight year court battle, the high court in New Delhi has given a sizeable chunk of the world's gay citizens critical new freedoms—the freedom to love and the freedom from criminality—by repealing a section of the India Penal Code best left in the 1860's, when it was first passed.

In 2009, how far have we really come? Do a few same-sex marriage laws and some changes to human rights legislation really protect us from those who still—and probably always will—see us as "the other"? We in the west sometimes take our freedoms for granted. There was once a time when we were once illegal in Canada. News out of India serves to remind me that in many areas around the world the journey has just begun. News out of Fort Worth reminds

me that my freedoms are still out of balance.

Over 20 years ago I began marching in the streets, hoping that my voice added to others would form an irresistible chorus for change. I wrote, and still write, letters and articles and essays and fiction and poetry in protest. I've experienced a revolution still in progress. I celebrate with my community the victories but I don't see the world through the rose-coloured glasses I once wore. I am always vigilant and question everything and I believe others should do the same. Perhaps this has made me jaded and somewhat coloured my outlook—no matter.

It's our collective responsibility to help safeguard the gains we've helped attain and respond when they're violated. Maybe on the fiftieth anniversary of Stonewall I'll be able to lift my glass to full equality for all, everywhere.

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


Last month Wayves asked you "During this time of Pride celebrations, what makes you proud to be a member of the LGBT community?" We received several responses:
